wrought by the Germans along the pathway of their retreat in France is to convince the German soldiers themselves that if they either desert or surrender to the French they will be instantly shot in reprisal.

German soldiers now being taken prisoners by the French along the entire front between the Aisne and Saint Quentin declare without exception to their captors that they realize they are going to be shot and are quite prepared for it.

While the Germans manifestly have various aims in view in their systematic policy of reducing every inch of French soil occupied by them to a wasteland desert, the French military authorities have been able to establish definitely from the German prisoners captured that not the least of these objects is to inject the morale of desperation into the German army.

The latter are told not only that they will be instantly killed if they fall into the hands of the French, but that unless they fight to the death in an effort to keep the Allied troops from reaching German soil their own homes, farms and villages will quite naturally suffer the same fate by way of reprisal that they have inflicted on the homes, farms and villages of France.

German soldiers now being taken prisoners as well as other sources confirm the fact that it was Hindenburg who conceived the idea for the wholesale devastation of all territory which the Germans are forced to abandon. It is under his orders that all German regiments now falling back on the western front have regularly appointed crews whose sole business it is to destroy all property and to leave every inch of the ground that goes back into the hand of the French a veritable desert.

Lighterage Delivery Case Up To I.C.C.

New York, May 30.—(United Press)—A hearing of the utmost importance to shippers opened here today when Examiner La Roe of the Interstate Commerce Commission heard evidence bearing on the proposed reduction in free time at railroad terminals upon carload freight designed for lighterage delivery. Under the present rule such freight is held in warehouses at terminals for five days gratis. The proposed rule would cut this period to two days. Members of the Merchants' association, interested in the reduction, testified.

CONSCRIPTION CAUSES MANY TO CROSS LINE

Spokane, Wash., May 30.—(United Press)—Conscriptions is causing a lot of traveling on the part of hundreds of young Americans and Canadians. Almost every train crossing the international line, say immigration officials carries young men who are going from the United States into Canada to escape the draft. The movement has been apparent for several weeks. Canadian authorities are carefully questioning each young man who seeks to cross the line and many, it is said, are refused permission to enter the United States. It has been reported here that many Canadians, endeavoring to dodge the conscription legislation now being drawn up, tell immigration officers that they are American citizens returning to their own country. Americans are said to use the same ruse, declaring at the line that they are Canadians.
