of varied climate which appeals to one.

Mr. Bradley come over on the U. S. Transport Sherman to San Francisco. The same vessel carried 142 German prisoners most of whom were crews from the German merchant vessels that were crippled as soon as war became known as a certainty. Mr. Bradley says that all the crews of the merchant vessels as soon as war was declared, at once demolished the machinery and equipment of the vessels so that it would take months to put them back in commission. The German prisoners brought over were sent to Angel Island but it is expected that later they will be sent to Douglas, Arizona.

A pleasant trip was reported by Mr. Bradley with the exception of the night. After dark a person was not even allowed to light a match or smoke on deck of the vessel. All lights from port holes had to be securely concealed or a light was not allowed in the room. A promenade on deck under such conditions was anything but enjoyable.

The transport Sherman on her return trip to the Islands took back with her 1,000 troops and supplies of various kinds. At the present time Honolulu has a post of 11,000 men, the largest group of soldiers under the American flag.
