Daily Chats With The Housewife

CORN MEAL AS AN ECONOMICAL FOOD

Many Tempting Breads, Cakes and Puddings May Be Prepared At Little Cost

Corn meal, as compared with other foods, is a low priced material and may be used as the basis for many appetizing dishes. The white and yellow meals differ somewhat in flavor but are much alike in composition, there being no difference in food values. The following excellent recipes are offered by Laura J. Cheney of O. A. C.

Corn Meal Puffs

1 quart milk, 2-3 cupfuls corn meal, 1-4 cupfuls sugar, 1 teaspoonful salt, 8 eggs, grated nutmeg. Cook the milk and meal together 15 minutes with the salt and sugar. When cool add the egg well beaten. Bake in cups. Serve with stewed fruit or jam.

Sour Milk Corn Bread

2 cupfuls corn meal, 2 cupfuls sour milk, 2 tablespoonfuls fat, 2 tablespoonfuls brown sugar, 1 1-4 teaspoonfuls salt, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoonful soda, 1 tablespoonful cold water. Cook the meal, milk, salt, butter and sugar in a double boiler for about ten minutes. When the mixture is cool, add the eggs well beaten and the soda dissolved in the water. Bake in a shallow iron or granite pan for about 30 minutes.

Buttermilk Waffles.

3 cupfuls water, 2 cupfuls corn meal, 2 cupfuls wheat flour, 1 cupful sweet milk, 4 eggs, 2 tablespoonfuls fat, 2 teaspoonfuls salt, 1 1-2 teaspoonfuls soda. Buttermilk or sour milk enough to make a thin batter. Cook the meal, water, salt and fat together in a double boiler for 10 minutes. When the mush is cool add the well beaten eggs. Sift the flour and soda together, add the flour and the sweet milk alternately to the corn mixture, finally add the buttermilk and beat thoroughly. This mixture is improved by standing a short time.

Corn Meal Puffs.

1 quart milk, 2-3 cupful corn meal,

Overlooked Land Meeting, City Hall, La Grande, June 9, 1:30 P. M.

At the request of citizens interested The Observer has called a meeting of landowners interested in taking steps to prevent the recurrence of the damage done by high water overflowing land in Union County. All the property owners interested are requested to attend the meeting for the purpose of discussing remedial measures, Saturday, June 9, at the City Hall, La Grande, at 1:30 P. M. It is desired that those affected, from Imbler clear through to Ladd Creek, and those affected by Catherine Creek and the Grand Ronde, including Dry Creek attend. It is estimated that future damage can be prevented at a cost not to exceed a total of \$2 per acre on the land benefited, at an annual cost of not over 50 cents an acre a year. It is hoped that every property owner affected will attend.
