SOLDIERS AND SAILORS JOIN DEMONSTRATION

COUNCIL ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS APPROVING REMOVAL OF EX-CZAR TO FORTRESS PETER AND PAUL

RUSSIAN CRIMINALS MAKE CITY UNSAFE

A Wave of Robberies and Violent Crimes Is Sweeping the City—Millionaire Merchant Killed at His Home—Minister of Commerce Resigns Because of Differences.

Petrograd, June 2.—(United Press)—Anarchists paraded the Nevsky Prospect, bearing banners, "Down with authority, and long live social revolution."

The speakers urged people to loot banks. Soldiers and sailors joined the demonstration. Arrest of the paraders was not attempted.

The workmen's and soldiers' council adopted resolutions approving the removal of the ex-Czar from the Palace to Fortress Peter and Paul.

Russian criminals that have been released are beginning a revolution, making Petrograd unsafe. A wave of robberies and violent crimes is sweeping the city. A millionaire merchant, Oregoriff, was killed at his home by three men.

Minister of Commerce Knovoloff resigned on account of differences with the Minister of Labor. Six thousand Petrograd clerks have struck and are demanding double wage retroactive since the beginning of the war.

FOURTEEN MEN ARE INDICTED IN CHICAGO

Chicago, June 2.—(United Press)—Fourteen men including Baron Kurt von Reigwitz, ex-German vice-council, and Gustav Jacobson were indicted by the federal grand jury and charged with alleged conspiracy in connection with a plot to foment a revolution in India.

Thirty Sign Up For Hospital Corps

Last evening a large number of the young men of the city gathered together in the Y. M. C. A. where they discussed the raising of the hospital corps from La Grande as asked for by Adjutant General White. Captain James A. Neer discussed the duties of the hospital corps and gave explanations regarding the same. Enthusiasm ran high among the young men and a number of them signed up stating that they would enlist providing the quota was secured here that would give La Grande the corps. Thirty have signed up and a number of others have signified their intentions of doing so.

Another rousing meeting is being planned at the Y. M. C. A. again tonight at 8 p. m. at which it is expected to secure the full number.

A number of the men of the community have been asking whether men could volunteer after registration or not. It is found that they can but after being drafted they cannot.

While men drafted into military service cannot volunteer for service in the regular army, registration on War Census day will be no bar to enlistment in the regular army.

This far-reaching decision has just been announced by the war department.

"Registration is no bar to enlistment."

"Men drafted for the army cannot be accepted for enlistment."

"Men of registration age accepted for enlistment prior to June 5 but not actually enlisted before that date must register."

"Notify all concerned and take action accordingly."

"Men who have been drafted cannot volunteer for the regular army."

GOVERNMENT BAGGS OVER 100 PLOTTERS

OTHER ANTI-CONSCRIPTIONISTS AND ANTI-REGISTRATION PLOTTERS ARE WATCHED

PLOTTERS ACTIVITIES DULLED BY FEAR OF LAW

Attorney General Gregory Is Inclined to Take More Optimistic View Since Plotting Started—Numbers Failing to Register Will Be Negligible Compared to Number Subject to Registration.

Washington, June 2.—(United Press)—Over one hundred anti-conscriptionists and anti-registration plotters are bagged to date. Other arrests are ahead. Plotters activities now seem dulled by fear of the law. The government has much evidence. Monday may see new outbursts.

Attorney General Gregory is inclined to take a more optimistic view since the plotting started. Officials estimated that the number failing to register is almost negligible when compared with the number subject to registration.

It has been a grand success in the past with such men as Otto Walker, 1915 world champion, and Dave Kenney, of Springfield, Mass., breaking three world records for a mile and a half, five miles and ten miles. The northwest title now belongs to Tracy Hollister, a local boy, and only a competitor here can take away his title this year to the "Red, White and Blue."

And nothing will be eliminated. The usual decorated auto parade which has always attracted the people, will still remain a feature. Prizes will be awarded as usual, but it is expected that people will be more attracted this year to the "Red, White and Blue" scheme of decorations as patriotism is the byword of the day.

"Street decorations will be more elaborate than ever," says Roscoe Neal, who is one of the powers behind the throne. "Our plans as they are developing will be a pleasant surprise."

Samuel Richardson Died Last Evening

Samuel F. Richardson, pioneer lumberman died last evening at his home after a lingering illness for nearly a year, his death being the result of paralysis.

Mr. Richardson was born February 23, 1842, in the town of Canaan, Maine. He was the sixth child of Bryant and Rachael Goodwin Richardson. When about seven years old he moved with his parents to the town of Hartland and there grew up and was educated in the public schools and Hartland Academy.

In 1864 he came west with his brother Joel and for a few years mined in Montana. He then returned to Maine and engaged in farming and stock raising.

On May 21, 1870, he was united in marriage with Miss Lilla Burrill, of Canaan, Maine. To them twelve children were born, only four of whom survived, Frank who resides at Council, Idaho; Joel H. and George B., of La Grande, and Helen (Mrs. John J. Broomfield) of Tamarack, Idaho. There are also four grandchildren, Francis Lilla, Olive Edna, Floyd Edison Richardson, and Lillian Fern Broomfield.

After following farming in his native state for some years during which time he held several town offices, and represented his town one term in the state legislature, Mr. Richardson moved to Wisconsin and engaged in lumbering for some years. In 1883 he came to Grand Ronde valley entering on the back of an Indian pony, the railroad not being completed. Here he engaged in lumbering in Stump town, now Perry, and became one of the pioneers in this section in the export lumber trade. He also engaged in farming and live stock business, raising horses, cattle and sheep and for some years maintained a general merchandise store at Hilgard. Lumbering, however, continued to be his chief vocation and in 1900 he moved to Idaho and there operated a sawmill and general mercantile store for about six years, when he retired from business there and returned to La Grande to look after his farming and stock business.

In 1909 he was elected representative to the state legislature and served one term. In 1910 he again engaged in lumbering in Idaho and continued to retain interests there until his death though he retired from active management of the business January

THE STAFF IS UNDERSTOOD TO FAVOR PLANS—THOUGH TRANSPORTING WILL BE DIFFICULT

TRANSPORT ACCOMMODATES SCARCELY TWO THOUSAND

Little Training Is Contemplated in American Camps—Real Intensive Training Will Take Place in British Cantonments and French Training Classes.

Washington, June 2.—(United Press)—Five divisions of the national guardsmen, about one hundred twenty-five thousand men, will be in Europe by winter, if army general staff plans are adopted.

Action on these plans are expected today or early next week.

It is understood the staff favor the plans, thought there is difficulty in transporting such large number of men before fall. A fairly large transport accommodates scarcely over two thousand men.

While plans are uncompleted, little training is contemplated in American camps, leaving the real hard intensive work to British cantonments and French training classes.

The war department proposes to pick the best trained guardsmen for service.

If transports are secured there will be practically no question about sending the men aboard before winter so trained in time to get into the autumn trained in time to get into the autumn drive.

COMMITTEE REPORT ADOPTED BY THE SENATE

PRESIDENT MAY SPEND SEVEN HUNDRED FORTY MILLION DOLLARS FOR MERCHANT MARINE

Washington, June 2.—(United Press)—The Senate accepted the conference report on the three billion three hundred forty million dollar urgent deficiency bill, which provides for army and navy appropriations. The measure empowers the President to spend seven hundred fifty million dollars for purchase and construction of merchantmen.

Grain exchanges and kindred organizations may be suspended by the President's proclamation during the war, under amendment to the food production bill which is now in the Senate.

The Senate passed the food production bill.

NINE REGIMENTS ENGINEERS ORDERED MOBILIZED FOR SERVICE

REGIMENTS WILL BE SENT TO FRANCE BUT WILL PROBABLY TRAIN HERE BEFORE SAILING

Washington, June 2.—(United Press)—The war department ordered into active service nine regiments of engineer corps. They will be sent to France and the regiments will probably be mobilized for training before sailing. Four regiments are at full war strength.

U. S. OFFERS FRANCE \$100,000,000 LOAN
