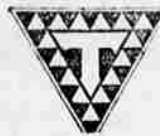

Couple Crossed the Plains by Ox-team 50 Years Ago and Now by Mitchell Motor

To cross the plains by ox-team and horses over the trail which cut the path for what is now known as the Lincoln Highway and then on the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding, to drive over the same trail with—nineteen seventeen Mitchell "Six" is an occasion to be enjoyed by very few.

CERTIFICATE OF REGISTRATION TO BE SHOWN

POLICE OFFICER MAY DEMAND
OF ANY MAN BETWEEN 21
AND 31 TO SHOW HIS
CERTIFICATE

Portland, Ore., June 2.—(United Press)—Any police officer of any city or county in Oregon will be entirely within his rights, after the taking of the War Census, June 5, in requiring any man between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, to show his little green certificate of registration.

This certificate can only be obtained by registering. It is an official receipt of registration.

Not only will the police officer be within his rights, but he will be doing his sworn duty in demanding to be shown the card if he suspects that registration has been evaded.

Furthermore, if the police officer finds a man of the designated age who has not registered, it is his duty forthwith to report him to the registration board. The officer himself will be subject to imprisonment if he fails to do this.

By direction of Governor Withycombe, the Adjutant General has called attention of all Oregon mayors to the fact that police officers must give every assistance in the execution of the conscription law. He has especially emphasized the following extract from the regulations:

"Police officers of any grade or class, of town, township, county or state, and all officers or agents of the Federal Government are required to render every assistance in the execution of this law. It is especially made the duty of such police officer to see that all male persons within the designated ages have registered and to report those who have not registered to the proper registration board for such action as may be necessary. Police officers may require any person subject to registration to exhibit his registration certificate."

Tomorrow Designated As Prison Sunday

Salem, Ore., June 2.—(United Press)—Tomorrow will be observed throughout Oregon as "Prison Sunday," so designated by a proclamation

issued by Governor Withycombe. The day was set apart at the request of individuals and organizations interested in the welfare of the penitentiary and the measure affecting the state prison which is on the ballot Monday. The purpose and general plan of "Prison Sunday" is outlined in the governor's proclamation, which follows in part: "I earnestly ask that ministers speaking from the pulpits of this state will acquaint themselves with the conditions existing in our state penitentiary and the needs thereof, and will on this Prison Sunday tell something of these conditions and of these needs to their congregations, to the end that their hearers may exercise their franchise function intelligently on the proposal for prison improvement, a betterment which all who are acquainted with our penal institution realize is vitally desirable from both an economic and humanitarian standpoint."
