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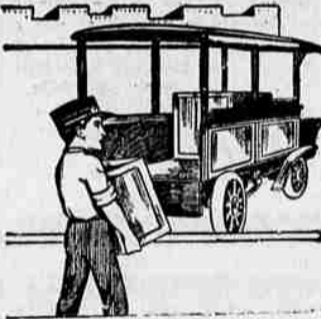

Germans Forbidden N.Y. Barred Zone.

New York, June 2.—(United Press)—America's heaviest blow at alien enemies in New York fell today when the U. S. marshal's order forbidding Germans to enter 20 barred zones around armories and naval militia stations in this city became effective. Between 15,000 and 20,000 males over 14 years of age are hit, it is estimated. The zones are of half mile radius.

Hundreds of permits were issued to Germans who had lived for years in the prohibited districts and bore good reputations, to persons employed there—who could get forceful recommendations from their employers—and to those who faced ruin if unable to enter the zones to conduct their business.

Those who obtained special permission to continue living in the districts cannot be visited by German friends, as no permits were granted "for social purposes." The forbidden areas in some instances took in German clubs, restaurants and hotels. Under the rule, enemy aliens can pass through the zones on public conveyances, but cannot alight en route. Germans without permits caught in the barred districts will be interned.

ARGENTINE BELIEVES U. S. WANTED TO FIGHT

Buenos Aires, June 1.—(United Press)—The Argentine view is that the United States is going to war rather because she has a good excuse than because she has a good reason. The Argentines who do think the United States has an adequate reason are also of the opinion that this reason was not the consideration which led her into war.

It is generally their judgment that the United States wanted to fight. They believe the United States to be a victim of the same sort of psychological influence which, after the commission of a sensational crime or a suicide, often causes the incident to be imitated by others.

They call attention to the fact that North Americans are accepting universal military service, food control and other big changes in the interests of the national service. The Argentine idea is that North Americans actually want to suffer hardships and privations because other people are doing so.

That is why Argentine is rather chilly toward the attitude North America has taken.

INLAND EMPIRE PREPARED TO SUPPLY LUMBER FOR U. S.

Spokane, Wash., June 1.—(United Press)—Lumber manufacturers of the Inland Empire are prepared today to supply their proportion of the lumber which the United States gov-

ernment will need for army and navy uses at whatever price may be fixed. This information was telegraphed to Washington D. C., after a meeting of a committee of the Western Pine Manufacturers' association, representing nearly 50 mills and an annual production of 1,500,000,000 feet. "We shall not suggest to the government any price on the lumber to be furnished from this district," said J. P. McGoldrick of the McGoldrick Lumber company, Spokane. "We are ready to do our share and any price fixed by the government will be acceptable to us. We will be prepared at every mill represented in the association to rush orders for government purposes." A committee of eight was appointed to make an apportionment among the association members of such orders as the government wishes to place. The apportionment will be placed upon the capacity of the plants and their shipping facilities. The members are H. H. Hornby, Dover, Idaho; A. W. Laird, Potlatch, Idaho; R. M. Hart, Coeur d'Alene, Idaho; W. C. Lubrecht, Bonner, Mont.; J. F. Fennessy, Libby, Mont.; J. P. McGoldrick; Thomas A. McCann, Bend, Ore.; and D. C. Eccles, Baker, Ore.

Rich Strike is Made at the Irondyke Mine

Baker, June 2.—(Special)—The most wonderful strike in the history of mining in this district has been made at the Irondyke copper mine at Homestead, where reports of the opening of a 125-foot wide ore body, reaching here the past few days, were confirmed by General Manager Emmett Galligan, who was in the city yesterday. Carrying gold values of \$12 to the ton, five per cent copper and two ounces in silver, with the wonderfully large ore body, the prospects are beyond calculation, seen and attested to by well known mining men and corroborated by Mr. Galligan who, while not reticent to discuss the property now that tangible results are manifested, has always been loath to boost the property and pessimistic rather than otherwise in his views.

Diplomat Arrives at Portland.

Portland, Ore., June 2.—(United Press)—William Widgery Thomas, diplomat, colonizer and author, arrived here this afternoon from San Francisco, accompanied by his wife. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas will be guests of honor at a banquet tonight given by the Swedish-born Americans. Thomas was first appointed to a diplomatic post by Lincoln. He was minister to Sweden and Norway for 15 years.

JAY STEVENS BECOMES STATE FIRE MARSHAL

Portland, Ore., June 2.—Jay Stevens, who as fire marshal, was able to make great reductions in Portland's fire losses, leaves the employ of the city today and will turn his attention to organizing the office of state fire marshal, created under an act of the 1917 legislature. After spending two months organizing the state office, Stevens will go to San Francisco and become manager of the Fire Prevention Bureau of the Pacific, a newly established fire prevention organization backed by the fire insurance companies. His territory will cover Oregon, Washington, California, Montana, Idaho, Utah, Arizona, Nevada and Alaska. He will organize fire prevention work in this big territory similar to that in Portland. Stevens

started in the fire service in Portland 13 years ago as a truckman. Step by step he worked up to the position of fire marshal and assistant fire marshal and assistant fire chief. He has served in every branch of the service and for a time or two was acting chief.
