Lumber Loss Is Great.

Spokane, Wash., June 2.—Conservative estimates place the loss to lumber mills on the Spokane, St. Joe and St. Maries rivers due to flood waters at \$500,000. The loss will be in lumber floated from stacks, which has to be rehandled, lumber deteriorated in grade by reason of unundation, cessation of mill operations and actual destruction of property.
