Notice of Proposed Sewer Construction and Assessment Thereof.

Notice is hereby given to all concerned that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, purposes and intends to improve Section 7 of Sewer District No. 1 of the City of La Grande, Oregon, by constructing therein, according to plans and specifications therefor adopted by said Commission on the 23rd day of May, 1917, an eight inch sanitary sewer, with all necessary manholes, catch basins, wye branches, excavations and fills therefor, from the present sanitary sewer of said City of La Grande at the center of Jefferson avenue at a point thereon opposite the center line of the alley running north and south through block 17 Grandy's addition to town of La Grande, Union county, Oregon, and extending north along the center line of said alley to the center line of Grandy avenue in said Grandy's addition, and to assess to the real property in said Section 7 of Sewer District No. 1 specially benefited by such improvement the cost of such construction; that the boundaries of the district to be affected and benefited by the said proposed improvement are as follows: Commencing at the center of the intersection of Second street and Jefferson avenue in Grandy's addition to the town of La Grande, Union county, Oregon, and running thence north along the center line of Second street to the center of the intersection of Second street and Grandy avenue in said addition, thence west along the center line of Grandy avenue to the center of the intersection of Grandy avenue and First street in said Grandy's addition, thence south along the center line of First street to the center of the intersection of First street and Jefferson avenue and thence along the center line of said Jefferson avenue to place of beginning; that the report of the committee on estimates for such proposed improvement has been approved and adopted by the Commission of said city and the same and said plans and specifications are now on file in the office of the Recorder of said city where they may be examined and said Commission will meet on the 27th day of June, 1917, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. at the Commission room in the City Building in La Grande, Oregon, and there hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance by any and all persons interested therein.

Joseph News Items

Weather Unsettled—Dates for Chautauqua Set—Joseph Boosters to Make Tour—North Bend Teacher on Visit—Food Preparedness Committee Organizes.

Joseph, June 2.—(Special)—The weather in Joseph still remains rather unsettled, but the last several days the chances of summer weather seem good.

The dates for the Chautauqua have been set for June 21-22-23-24-25-26. Joseph plans to advertise this event to the limit with the hope that all Wallawa County will be in attendance. Committees have been appointed, the place (the foot of Lake Wallawa) has been selected and all Joseph is preparing to make Joseph's first Chautauqua a big success. Free camping grounds will be provided for visitors at the foot of Wallawa Lake where they can be near the Chautauqua Tent for there will be "something doing all the
