EMPLOYEES HELPED TO BUY BONDS

LA GRANDE CONCERN BUYS BONDS AND ALLOWS ITS EMPLOYEES TO PURCHASE THEM ON MONTHLY INSTALLMENTS.

The La Grande Grocery company and its employees have bought \$3000 worth of Liberty Bonds and the company has arranged a plan of assisting its employees to acquire bonds on the installment plan.

The following are the subscriptions: La Grande Grocery Co., \$2500; William Day, \$50; G. L. Larison, \$100; F. A. Charboneau, \$50; F. C. Appling, \$50; G. W. Harnden, \$50; Bruce Cox, \$50; Leah Swalberg, \$50; Kenneth Evans, \$50; J. R. Rhodes, \$50.

Under this plan the employer buys the bonds and the employee pay from \$2 to \$3 for 17 months on a \$50 bond and \$4 to \$6 a month on a \$100 bond. The employees are allowed 3 1/2 per cent interest on their payments, the same as paid on the bonds.

M'LOUGHLIN, COAST SAYS, IS ON WAY BACK

New York, June 7.—From the Pacific Coast comes the news that Maurice McLoughlin, the red-headed comet of tennis, is on his way back to new fame. Picking out a doubles contest in which McLoughlin, with some able help from Willis Davis, downed William M. Johnston and Wallace Strachan the coast fans have been praising the former unbeatable champion until their throats must ache.

Reports of Mac's return to form must be taken with something of a grain of salt. His feat in winning, almost single handed, the doubles match spoken of doesn't mean an awful lot. He virtually performed the same thing a year ago at Forest Hills here, but failed when he started against the stars in the singles contest.

McLoughlin was so good in the best days of his career and is different now that a comparison between the two is something almost impossible. When a fan sees Mac streak along for a short time with his fierce drives and speedy return shots from unbelievable angles he immediately loses all control of his emotion and pronounces McLoughlin on the way back.

There isn't a tennis fan in the United States who wouldn't like to see McLoughlin's sorrel tresses again adorned with the national crown. There never was a more popular athlete in any branch of sport than the red-headed tennis streak. But to say that McLoughlin has reached the heights he once attained probably is overdoing it. It is hard to believe he has accomplished what he failed in doing a year ago after making such a brilliant showing in doubles play.

Undoubtedly the praise he has received and the satisfaction he must have gained in being able to down a former national champion in Johnston will be a most impelling thing in sending Mac to try his hand at the game again next fall on the Forest Hills courts. He can't win a championship this year, for there will be no such thing, but he can find out if he is ready.
