This plan is to build a new Methodist Episcopal church which is to be made a community center. The Rev. C. C. Pratt has secured pledges for all the lumber necessary, also for considerable money. A half acre of land has also been donated. The plan is to build a large church in which not only the spiritual needs of the people will be met and cared for but some of their physical and intellectual needs as well.
