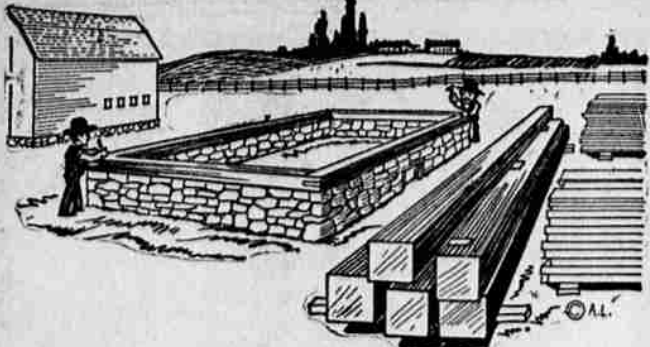

Report Of City Manager For Week

No Fires Reported—Fines For Month \$149.90—Budget Estimates Kept Under—Cigarette Ordinance Held Over.

To the Hon. Commission of City of La Grande: We herewith submit our report for the week ending June 6, 1917.

Fire chief reports no fires for the week. His monthly report shows but one fire which was in the South Methodist church.

Chief of police reports 14 arrests for the week, 10 of which were traffic violations, 2 disorderly conduct and 2 assault and battery. Number of convictions 12, amount of fines collected \$57.50. Number of street lights out during week two. His monthly report shows number of arrests 50, amount of fines collected \$423.40, number of stock impounded 22, and fees collected from pound

\$26.50, making a total of \$449.90 for the month of May.

Street superintendent's report for the week ending June 2d, shows an expenditure of \$100.75, \$27.50 of which was for repairing cross walks, \$30.00 for smoothing dirt streets, \$5.00 for cleaning catch basins and \$5.00 for white-wings.

Water superintendent reports expense for the week as \$33.00, divided between reading meters, making taps and repairing leaks.

Miscellaneous licenses issued to the amount of \$13.35 as per treasurer's receipts number 5772 and 5849.

Herewith for your information, I hand you comparative budget statement for the months of January, February, March, April and May, 1916-17. You will notice for this period in 1917 the total expense is \$24,062.83 as against \$27,936.32 for the like period in 1916. The principal saving has been in the street and water departments. You will also notice that of the \$7000.00 appropriated in the 1917 budget for septic tank, it has been necessary to use but \$321.53, this being the amount expended in pumping and cleaning the septic tank. We have examined the tank and found that it is functioning correctly and we anticipate no further trouble for at least another season.

In view of the fact that we feel

assured that we will have ample water this season I would recommend that the water superintendent be instructed to double the minimum for the months of July and August. This, in my estimation, is a solution of the water problem during the irrigation season.

The Cigarette Ordinance has been read twice and was held over until next commission meeting.

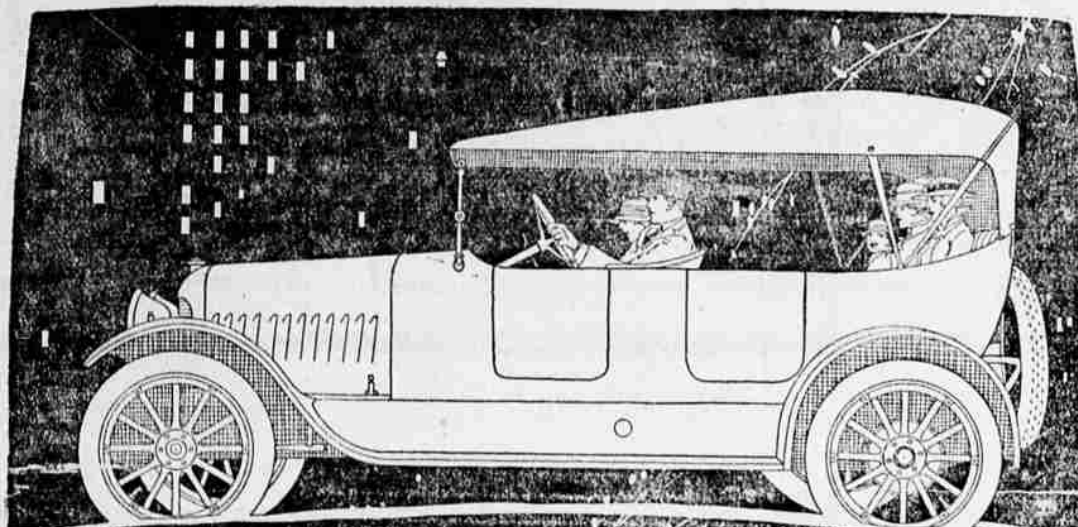
