HOW CROWDS IN LONDON RECEIVE WOUNDED MEN

Greeted and Cheered With Welcome of Triumphant Heroes Returning Home.

Lowering dusk and a raw wind; dense crowds, a gray ambulance line drawn up in the train shed, a suppressed feeling of emotion—this is how London welcomes "back home" her wounded from the great push.

It was so the other night. Londoners cheered and threw flowers, dinners grew cold in a thousand households—but the wounded were greeted with the welcome of triumphant heroes.

By the time the train arrived the audience had grown to two long rows five or ten deep in the train shed and thousands more outside.

The first ambulance sneaked timidly out of the shed, seeming to tiptoe through the rows of craning necks. Coster women ripped through the crowd shrilling their cry of "V!ets! Sweet v!ets and daffydils for the wounded!" and peddling with both hands.

Peering into the shadowy interior of the creeping ambulance, the crowd saw six men lying on the swiveling cots with a nurse stooping over, examining the symptom card of one. Flowers rained out of the crowd, gently pelting the wounded. Violets and daffodils, poorly aimed, fell under the wheels—but no matter. Their intentions were good. The wounded men propped themselves up and nodded in response to the welcome. One had been shot through the face, for only one eye and a portion of his nose were showing through the bandage. Still, he seemed to smile with that one eye.

Just off the fringe of the throng a little cubbyhole of a cigar store was enjoying a business rush. Two clerks shoved out cigarettes in twenty-fives and fifties.

"Gimme hundred Virginias," one white whiskered man demanded. He grabbed four packages and pushed back to his place on the curb, extracting handfuls to throw at the wounded men.

Ambulances were filing softly past in regular intervals of half a minute, their headlights flashing on the shiny pavement. Some had a "sitter," a man whose wounds permitted him to sit up in the stretcher. The sitters waved back at the fluttering handkerchiefs, and nurses smiled in appreciation of the tribute to the men.

At the last came an ambulance that moved even more carefully than the others. Most people in London have some one out in France these days, and the particular ambulance obviously carried some one who was very badly off. The cheering hushed.

Through the back of the car a doctor was seen bending over a wounded man. A little homely woman in the front rank covertly made the sign of the cross and then smiled up at her son, whose face was disfigured and whose sleeve was marked with the gold stripe showing he had been wounded "doing his bit."

PRESS FAVORS TRAINING PLAN

542 Papers Approve Permanent Universal Service.

Three hundred and eighty-one additional newspapers have been canvassed on permanent universal military training by the National Security league since the result of the original poll was announced. Of these 243 advocated universal training, 121 were noncommittal and 17 were opposed.

In all 857 newspapers have been canvassed. Of these 542 favor universal training, 252 are still noncommittal and 63 are opposed.

Since the first canvass twenty-seven papers which were noncommittal now advocate universal training.

NAMING SUBMARINES.

First United States Undersea Boats Took Cognomens From Fish.

Every one knows what submarines are and what an important factor they have become in modern naval warfare. Their nomenclature is interesting, says the Popular Science Monthly.

In the United States navy the first of these crafts were named for various kinds of fish and reptiles, and we had such odd cognomens as Adder, Moccasin, Pike, Sturgeon, Shark, Carp, Haddock, etc., on the naval lists. Before this list of piscatorial names ran out the system was changed, and designations of A-1, A-2, B-1, B-2, etc., down to the more recent submarine authorized in 1915, known as the O class.

In general the numbers applied correspond to the particular lot in which they were constructed, and the letters closely follow the number of years since they were first built. In Germany they are all known as U boats, the U being the first letter of unterseeboot, meaning submarine.

QUAKERS READY TO AID.

Dr. Cadbury Says 125,000 Will Offer Services.

There are 125,000 Quakers in the United States ready to offer their services to the country in case of war, according to Dr. Henry Joel Cadbury, professor of Biblical literature in Harvard college. Dr. Cadbury, who is also chairman of the Friends' National Peace Conference executive committee, said to a newspaper man:

"While most of the Friends feel that they cannot violate the unmistakable teaching of Jesus Christ by taking up arms against their fellow men, they are ready to serve their country in any way that is permitted by the dictates of their consciences."

LOAN AMAZES ITALY.

Only America Could Make It, Rome Paper Declares.

The Giornale d'Italia of Rome in a long article on the American loan says that to give a practical idea of the largeness of the sum one must have recourse to fantastic comparisons. The American war credit contains practically seven times the number of minutes lived by humanity since the birth of Christ.

Never since the beginning of the world has any group of bankers, it says, given at one stroke such a colossal loan to states at war, and only a great confederation like America can permit herself such liberality.
