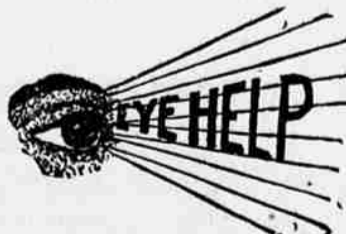

VROOMAN CALLS THIS A WAR AGAINST FAMINE

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Says We May Be Called on to Feed Teutons.

A part of America's food problem is to make provision for helping to feed the population of the central powers after the war, according to Carl Vrooman, assistant secretary of agriculture. "If the war ends this year, or whenever it ends," he said, "a part of the task of the United States will be to help feed the people of Germany and her allies, who will assuredly be in dire need when they stop fighting. "This war," he continued, "is a war against famine. It will be won by the nation that can best supply itself and its allies with food."

Mr. Vrooman has just come from a tour of the southern and southwestern states, where he was sent by the department of agriculture to urge greater food production. He said the department had been assured by the farmers of the south and west that they would add 20 per cent to their normal production of crops. He advised southern farmers to raise less tobacco and more grain.

Mr. Vrooman said that the prospects for a big wheat crop in the United States were poor. He also said that Argentina would have a small crop. He expected the United States government to follow the lead of European governments in prescribing "war bread"—that is, bread that used all of the wheat. He estimated this would mean a saving of from 40,000,000 to 50,000,000 bushels of wheat a year in America.

"With the farmers of the United States doing their part to better the food situation," he said, "it is the part of the city dwellers to help by conserving the supply."

He said \$700,000,000 a year in food was wasted in the kitchens of the United States and urged the housewives to practice economy in food and to teach their cooks to practice economy.

"The average American when he goes into a restaurant orders enough food for three persons," he said, "just because he can pay for it."

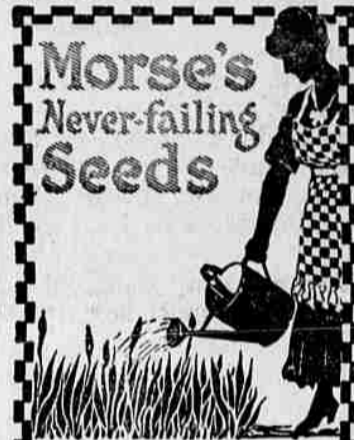
