LIVESTOCK REVIEW.
Portland, June 12.—(Special).—Receipts for the week were: 1650 cattle; 130 calves; 3500 hogs and 1900 sheep. The cattle market has not shown much improvement as yet, although sellers were able to dispose of their holdings in good shape, steady prices ruling most all week, probably a few sales of top beef made a little height, although common and ordinary stuff was very slow in turning and prices

were probably shaded at times 25c. Most all killers seemed to be fairly well supplied, but with only moderate receipts throughout this week they have had a chance to clean up considerable. The beef steer top for the week was \$10.25 or 25c above a week ago, with a load of baby steers weighing around 950 going at 10c. A number of loads of real good fat California steers sold from \$9.25 to \$9.75—fair to good steers brought from \$8.75 to \$9.00, with medium grades around \$8.00 to \$8.50—Common to

ordinary stuff ranged from 5c to 7c. Best beef cows were in good demand all week and sold from \$8.00 to \$8.50, with good cows from \$7.50 and up. Medium dairy bred cows, of which there was a good supply sold from \$6.50 to \$7.25, with ordinary kinds at 6c. Common cows sold all the way down to 4c. Best heifers sold up to 9c, with medium light ones from \$7.50 to \$8.00—Strictly fat, heavy beef and bologna bulls met a continued good demand at steady prices, selling from \$7.00 to \$7.75—Fair to good heavy bulls brought \$6.50 to \$7.00, while light Jersey bulls sold from 5c to 6c. A lot of prime veal calves brought \$9.50, with a top of 10c. All of our cattle are coming from California points. Stocker and feeder demand was light, with only a small supply here prices were generally unchanged, with an absent speculative demand. Prices in the hog market continued their downward trend all week, with the bulk of sales fully 25c lower than a week ago. Top of the market for the week was \$15.75, while a few strictly choice loads at the week's opening went at \$16.00. Choice hogs today are not bringing over \$15.35, with the bulk of the sales from \$15.15 to \$15.25. Pigs sold mostly at 13c, with a few bunches up to \$13.50—All packers and butchers were bearish, practically all week. Eastern markets were off fully 50c for the week. Government reported provisions in stock shows a big decrease for May and the declines all over the country seem unwarranted with the advancing grain prices. The regular June break in hogs is apparent. Sheep receipts, while of fairly good volume are much lighter than a year ago and are showing a big decrease under two years ago. Practically all the sheep here during the week were from the Willamette Valley and from present indications the Willamette valley crop this year will be very short. Demand has been excellent and prices are generally 25c higher than a week ago. Spring lambs have sold mostly at \$13.75 all week, with a couple of bunches at 14c. Shorn yearlings brought from \$11.00 to \$11.25, with a load of good fat two year old shorn wethers bringing \$10.50. Good shorn ewes sold mostly at \$9.50 with heavy ones from \$8.50 to \$9.00. Good bucks are bringing \$7.50 to \$8.00.—PORTLAND UNION STOCKYARDS CO.
