Dell Blanchett, owner of a string of twenty-five from Pendleton was injured yesterday while throwing a steer in the steer contest, sustaining painful injuries by catching his right hand in the rope and dislocating his wrist and bruising his hand.

The half mile dash was won by J. L. Wade, owner of Dr. Smoot; second Blanchett; third B. D. Sherry.

During the middle of the afternoon program fifty members of Company M arrived at the grounds under command of Captain Neer, having hiked from La Grande to this city. The boys were greeted with cheers and met by the Union band which escorted them down the race track.

In the arena, potato races, steer roping contest, and many other special events were held.

The most thrilling race of the entire afternoon was the Roman race which was won by the favorite rider, Ben Corbett; Fred Spain winning second. The horses ran neck and neck around the entire track Corbett winning by a final spurt in an exciting finish.

The boys' Shetland pony race was of unusual interest. The ponies owned by M. S. Levy of Union, showing an amazing speed. Winners in the event were, Archie Simmons, first; Wayne Perkins, second; Darrel Vand Vanter, third.

The chariot race concluded yesterday afternoon's racing program, two teams taking part. Manford Alexander winning the race by a close margin over H. W. B. Smith of Union.
