the maternal membranes. Such losses are inexcusable.

Thirdly, the proper care and feeding of the mother during the first few days after the birth of the young determines in a large measure the success or failure of the owner as a breeder. Navel-ill in colts, and constipation in calves, colts, pigs and lambs are conditions which are easily remedied and the youngster started on the road to success. Hearty, heated, constipating feeds, such as wheat, barley or corn, should be avoided. In fact, it is better not to feed any grain for 24 hours after parturition and then by slow degrees work the young mother back to her former ration. Ten days would be the proper length of time in which to attain full feed. Normal exercise should also be given. The feed and care of the mother will reflect directly upon her offspring. If the youngster becomes constipated give it a small dose of castor oil. If it scours, cut the mother's feed in half.
