The showman's prize the first big prize yet awarded which was for the best groomed horse went to W. Ledbetter for his handsome stallion "Wilson's Idol," second to "Calloway King," owner Gus Levy; third to J. A. McCarthy for "Black Dandy." Trophy for this class was awarded by J. D. Farrell, president of the O.-W. R. R. & N. Co.

The driving ponies (Shetlands) award for the best young lady driver went to Mrs. Mae Maas of Union, second to Miss Elizabeth Eaton, third to Miss Alice Hall both of Union.

The high jumping contest for the silver trophy was won yesterday by "Baldy" owned by J. Oliver; second Gus Levy; third Bert Woods.

The inner arena offered the most thrilling excitement of any previous show. Miss Olie Osborn, a Union girl, made the hit of the day by her splendid riding exhibitions. Miss Kitty Wilkes famed for her riding was also on the list of the fine riders. Many of the old timers broke into the buckaroo game again, among them we find Buffalo Vernon, John Spain, Ben Corbett (here with his genial grin as good a Hippodrome rider as ever), Dell Blanchett of Pendleton, has given very pleasing results with his string of racers and bucking horses.

The ladies relay was won again by Miss Sherry, riding the Blanchett string. The gentlemen's relay was won again by the Blanchett string, Rube Foster riding. The cowboy race which always offers unusual excitement was also won by Blanchett.

Ben Corbett, the favorite, lost the Roman race to Ben Dobbin today by a bad start, this race being the thriller of the day. The boys' shetland race was won by Simmons; second Perkins; third Wilson. Miss Sherry gave an exhibition of fancy riding.

Friday's Program.

Union, Ore., June 15.—(Special)—The horse parade at noon today proved to be a novel event. Headed by Governor James Withcombe on his favorite saddle mare, "Loretta" the parade wended its way from the grounds through the city streets. Following the governor and his escort came Company M. The horses with their purple, blue, red and white ribbons gave a festival air.

Events at the show grounds began with an exhibition drill by Company M. Among the special features of the afternoon was the Union Preparedness Special, a patriotic float bearing an old cannon, a relic of the city, with military escort of small boys was drawn by a four-horse team of shetland ponies.

Rounds of applause and cheers greeted Governor Withycombe as he appeared on his favorite horse "Loretta" before the grandstand. She was put through the strides by the governor, waiting to the music of the band. He gave a short address congratulating Union County upon the splendid display of live stock on exhibition at the show. He said: "It is our patriotic duty to increase our flocks and herds." He said that the work of the association was done nobly.

The novelty race was won by Bert Woods again today. The shetland pony race which was of unusual interest to the audience, was won by Wayne Perkins, second Archie Simmons, hird Kenneth Wilson; the ponies belonging to M. S. Levy of Union.

The Roman race throughout the three days was a thriller. Ben Corbett winning the event by a close margin. The chariot race was won all three days by Manford Alexander.

The cattle exhibited were paraded before the grandstand. Among the winners the aged herd of Shorthorns was won by the G. W. Delay herd of Rushes Farm, Hot Lake.

The breeders' young herd—First, W. J. Townley of the Mounds Farm, Union. Breeders' calf herd, won by G. W. Delay. Get of Sire, "Violet King" owned by W. J. Townley. Produce of Cow, owned by R. E. Boyce, Baker.

These herds were hailed by the cattle experts present as the finest in the Northwest.

The grand champion shorthorn cow was owned by one of the youngest breeders in the state, Donald Gale, of Union, 18 years old.

Besides this type of cattle the Bell Brothers, of Cove, were present with their fine Jerseys, winning the championship of the Jerseys with their beautiful heifer. Grand champion bull of this class was owned by W. W. Stevens of Union.

Voluntary Enlistment of British Subjects in the United States.

The Congress of the United States having passed an act permitting the voluntary recruitment, within the United States, of British subjects for service with the British Army conditional upon regulations issued by the United States Secretary of War. Male British subjects between the ages of 18 and 40 years inclusive re-

siding in the state of Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho, or in the Territory of Alaska, who are not naturalized American citizens, are requested to register their names and addresses at the British Consulate, Portland, Oregon.
It must be understood that registration does not necessarily imply obligation or compulsion.
