LA GRANDE CONGRATULATED ON TRAPSHOOTERS' VICTORY

All hail to the La Grande Gun club trapshooters!

The first annual tournament of the Columbia-Willamette Trapshooters' association came to a successful close Sunday when the final matches of an exceptionally exciting race were contested.

Two engagements were staged, La Grande featuring in both. The first was a 123-to-115 victory over the Capital City Gun club of Salem, Or., the result causing a tie for the leadership of the circuit, and the second affair was a 123-to-116 victory over the Woodburn, Or., Gun club.

By virtue of the showing made yesterday, the La Grande nimrod won the Oregonian first place trophy, while second place trophy was awarded to the Woodburn boys. There is no difference in the beautiful trophies and it is well now that the season has been completed.

Lou Rayburn and Claud Mackey each went straight for La Grande yesterday as did Roy Forester, who made his "debut" as a member of the La Grande team. Robert Smith and Bert Hughes each missed one bird, making the total 123.

For Salem, Lewis and Wilson each smeared 124 and Magers dropped two out of his 25. Cooley and Brown were able to break 22 in order to make the total read 115. The Woodburn scores were: Leith 24, Feller, 24, Hawman 23, Whitney 23 and Beach 22; total 116.

Lost 500 Sheep.

About 500 eyes and young lambs died in transit from Idaho, or shortly after arriving at Baker Monday, close shearing, 48 hours on the train without feeding and cold weather being the cause, according to a story from Baker. They were a portion of several thousand shipped by R. N. Stanfield to turn on the range near Auburn. Many of them fell by the roadside in the southwest part of Baker as they were driven out, the herders giving them to boys, who took many into houses and barns and saved them. Over a hundred dropped dead in stock pens after unloading, about that number died on the train; others died after the herders started out with them.
