Cable Letters To Soldiers. Announcement was made today by the Western Union Telegraph Company of a special week-end cable letter service for the benefit of American military and naval forces serving in Europe. Letters by telegraph and cable may be sent to American soldiers or sailors in England or France, for delivery the Monday morning after being sent, at a rate of nine cents per word, with no minimum charge. The letters will be handled between London and points in France by mail. This is 28 cents per word less than the fast cable message rate. The special low rate will also apply to cablegrams sent by the American fighters to points in the United States, and if the "Boys" are too busy to write; a weekly cable letter will let the folks back home know they are all right and won't cost much either.
