Strawberry Crop Short.

Portland, Ore., June 19.—(United Press)—The Washington and Oregon strawberry crop will be about 50 per cent of normal, owing to the unusually late spring, and other fruit crops in the northwest will suffer even a greater loss, according to advices reaching here, today from various northwestern fruit centers. Only good weather conditions during the next months will save half the strawberry crop, say the growers. Only a fraction of the usual cherry crop will be harvested. Pears will not produce as heavily as usual, and prunes suffered severely. Grapes in most districts suffered. Apples alone will produce somewhere near a normal crop, although late reports cut down somewhat the earlier estimates.
