McNamara could have signed-up with some Irish regiment for, despite his fifty-odd years, he is still a "foine broth av a boy!" Instead, he braved the submarines to fight under the flag that for thirty years he had called his own.
Michael has a bit of the stuff of which loyal Americans and heroes are made.

Letters From The Front
V. T. Nixon, of Co. D-9, U. S. Naval Training Station, San Francisco, writes his mother Mrs. R. M. Nixon, La Grande, D. D. No. 1.)
San Francisco, June 11, 1917.
Dear Mother:—I have been here almost a week and like it fine so far. And this detention camp, so I am told, is the worst part of it.
I was vaccinated a few days ago and also had a T. P. shot in the other arm. Will get two more, I guess. Some of the lads faint when they get their shots. I saw two of them fall over while I was up for mine. I guess there were 150 of us in the bunch I went up with.
There were almost 200 men arrivals in camp yesterday. They surely are pouring in here every day.
How did registration day pass in La Grande? I went up and volunteered the last day of May. I could not stand the idea of being conscripted. That word surely does not sound good to me.
I am rated as fireman 2nd. There are many 3rd rate firemen here and about 19 2nd class men.
I expect I will make pretty good money here and have a good chance to learn the machinist trade. So you see when we wollop the Dutchmen good and hard and my enlistment is up I will come out with two trades.
Tell Dad he can do whatever he wants to or things best with "Silver" as I am enlisted for four years, but I expect the war to be over before my enlistment is up. I will have a chance for first-rate fireman and believe me I expect to be a first-rate man inside of a year.
I didn't want to go to war any worse than anyone else, but I did the only thing that was honorable as it appeared to me. At least I will always have the satisfaction of telling myself that I was a volunteer and not conscripted.
I was making good money when I left Globe. I lost two days in the last half of the month but the time keeper gave me straight time. You see he and I are fraternal brothers. He bought me a fine emblem button the day I left Globe and another carpenter, who I worked with, gave me a nice ruby stud. Hope I don't lose them and can get them home. My trunk is over in the city and I have one thousand shares of oil stock in it. I hope I can get shore leave soon and send it home.

STOCK MARKET REPORT
Cattle.
Portland, June 19.—(Special)—Cattle receipts, for last week have been very moderate only 680 head being offered, being one of the smallest on record. There has been practically no change in the prices since the first of the week, most of the receipts included half dairy cows with only a few bunches of steers. There is a continued call for good cattle and the market is firm on these grades. Best beef steers are being quoted at \$9.50 to \$10.00, good steers \$8.75 @ \$9.25; best cows \$8.00 to \$8.50; heifers \$8.00 to \$9.00; the stocker and feeder division has a splendid outlook, liberal receipts are expected and cattle men will have excellent opportunity to get just what they want.
Hogs.
Hog receipts totaled around 3600 head, though the market has dropped at least 15 cents during the week, prime heavy hogs are getting \$15.10 with the bulk going at \$15; pigs are selling from \$12.00 to \$13.00.
Sheep.
Sheep receipts for the week are 5200 head; the market has dropped since Monday about 25 cents on lambs, 50 cents on ewes wethers and yearlings; shorn yearlings are selling from \$8.00 @ \$10.50 shorn ewes \$7.60 @ \$9.00; best spring lambs \$13.50 @ \$13.75.
