Dyott, the pastor, officiating, and only a few intimate friends of the couple being present. Miss Dougherty graduated from the University of Oregon with the June class of 1916. Mr. Hamstreet graduated with the June class of 1917. During their student days the young couple were thrown much together. Fellow students suspected a romance long ago, but none was taken into the secret of the forthcoming wedding at this time.
