Batesville Raises \$500. Batesville, Grant Co., June 20.—(Special)—Last evening, with a population of only 100 the new town of Batesville got on the map by raising \$500 for the Red Cross War Fund in 30 minutes. This is twice as much as was assessed against Batesville and as much as the quota of the entire Austin district.

Batesville is a new town on the line of the Sumpter Valley Railroad in Grant County, where G. H. Rush, of La Grande, is building a sawmill for the Pacific States Timber Investment Co.

Among those to give were 25 Serbian laborers who responded enthusiastically through their foreman Mr. Yankovovich.

If the rest of the towns and sawmills responded as enthusiastically as Batesville the Austin district should raise \$2000 for the Red Cross.

When the ladies asked when they could see the men they were told to come back at 6:30 and when they did they found all the work had been done for them and the \$500 raised.
