SAVE SUGAR IN JELLY MAKING

Washington, D. C., June 22.—(Special)—Much waste of sugar and spoilage of jellies can be avoided by using a simple alcohol test recommended by the Bureau of Chemistry, United States Department of Agriculture. To determine how much sugar should be used with each kind of juice put a spoonful of juice in a glass and add to it one spoonful of 95 per cent grain alcohol, mixed by shaking the glass gently. Pour slowly from the glass, noting how the pectin—the substance in fruits which makes them jelly—is precipitated. If the pectin is precipitated as one lump a cup of sugar may be used for each cup of juice, if in several lumps the proportion of sugar must be reduced to approximately three-fourths the amount of the juice. If the pectin is not in lumps but is merely precipitated, the sugar should be one-half or less of the amount of the juice. If the juice shows no precipitation under this test, it is unsuitable for jelly making and must be combined with apples or other juices rich in pectin.

The housewife will do well before making the test, to taste the juice, as fruits not as acid as good tart apples probably will not make good jelly unless mixed with other fruits which are acid.

SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS HOLD MEETING AT BOISE

The Seventh-day Adventists are to have their annual encampment at the Fair Grounds in Boise, Idaho, June 25 to July 1. The indications are that this is to be the largest campmeeting that they have ever held in this conference which includes Southern Idaho and part of Eastern Oregon. Over one thousand people will attend the meetings. Speakers from all parts of the country are being brought together to assist in the work. The railroads will give special rates of one and one-third fare for the round trip, from June 21 to July 3. Certificates must be received from the ticket agent and signed by H. A. Borg, Bible instructor in the Loma Linda Medical college, will be present. Elder Earnest Lloyd, publicist and writer, comes from the Pacific Press in California. Others who will be present are Elder H. W. Cottrell, of Portland, Oregon; Elder J. F. Piper, of Seattle; and Elder C. W. Flaiz, of Walla Walla, Washington.

Lectures will be given three times a day by the different speakers. There will be departments for the Young people, children, and other classes. Those who have charge of the work believe that this will be the most successful meeting of this kind ever held in the state, in fact it will be a Bible Chautauque. They extend an invitation to every one to attend. H. A. Green, of Boise, has charge of arrangements.
