For the past six months this Griffith masterpiece has been playing to crowded houses at the Liberty the-

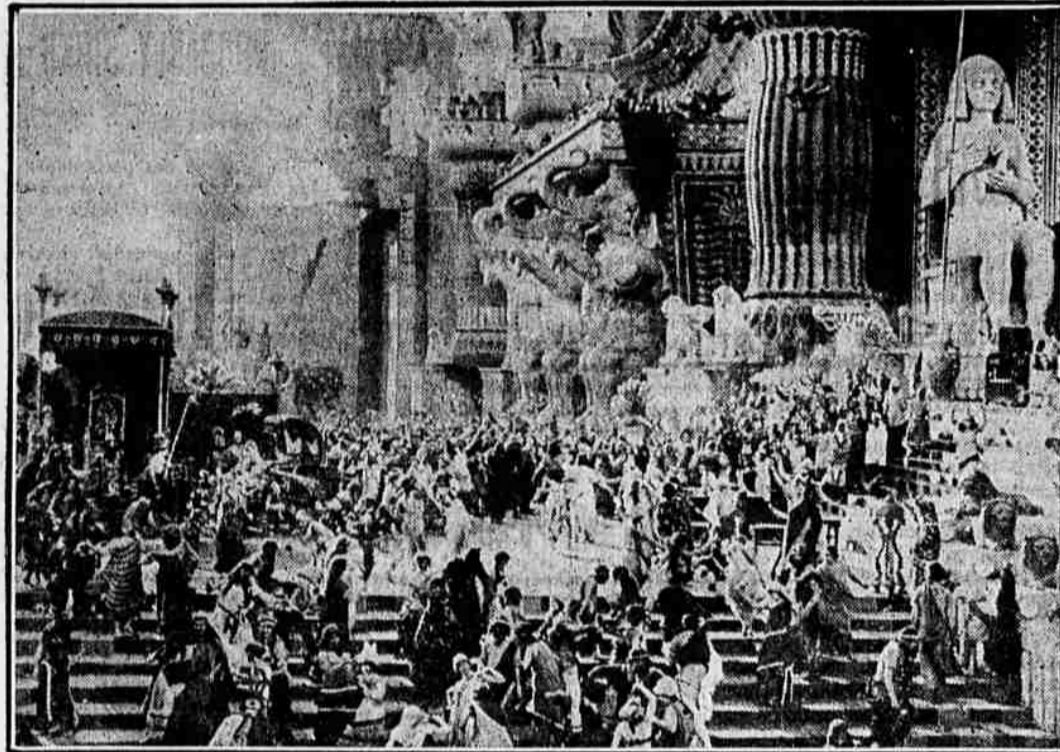

Draft Will Bring Health Survey of Over 2,000,000

Under the provisions of the selective draft bill at least 2,000,000 young men between the ages of nineteen and twenty-five will be subjected to a rigid physical examination to determine their fitness to serve in the army which the administration plans to train to a high point of efficiency for possible service in France.

This will be the most widespread physical survey of the vitality and health of the nation ever made. During the civil war many more men were examined in the course of four years, but never as many within the time which will be devoted to the examination of the young men who are to make up the new fighting force of the United States.

Just what the machinery will be for the examination of the young men of today has not been determined. The physicians and surgeons of the country are being organized rapidly by the general medical board, appointed at the instance of the Council of National Defense.

This organization within a short time will reach into many thousands of counties. It already has been started in more than 3,000. Whenever their services are required these men can be called upon for medical examinations.

There are about 7,000,000 men of between nineteen and twenty-five in the country. It is estimated that probably 5,000,000 of these will be exempted for one cause or another, principally because their services would be equally or more valuable in present vocations than at the front. Large numbers also will be exempted on account of having dependent relatives and many because of serious physical defects.

Exempted Not Examined.

The medical forces of the entire nation would not be adequate to examine carefully all of these men physically. It would require a year or more for the work. Consequently men in the exempted classes will not be examined. While this will modify the value of the nation wide health survey, the number to be examined throughout the states will furnish a fair index as to the relative physical stamina of each community.

Eminent physicians and surgeons in the army, navy, public health service and those connected with the general board of the Council of National Defense are looking forward to the results of the physical examination of so large a number of young men. Persons interested in social welfare are equally interested in the project.

It is entirely probable that men will be passed into the army who have minor defects who are now consistently rejected. But no man who is physically deficient will be permitted to get by unless he manages to fool the examining surgeons.

There are two reasons why great care will be exercised in the examination of young men for all branches of the government service. The first is to insure a fighting machine as nearly perfect as possible. Another is to guard the public treasury against another great drive by pensioners. Uncle Sam is willing to pay any man a pension who incurs disability in the service, but he is desirous of reducing the number to a minimum, so far as it is possible to do so by determining the exact physical condition of recruits at the time of enlistment.

The wholesale examination of young men for military service, together with the examinations now on for enlistment, the big increase in enlistments for the navy and marine corps and for several classes of reserves should give the country a valuable survey and throw much light on the general state of the public health.

The first increment of 500,000 for the selective draft army is to be mustered in just as soon as registration is completed or not later than Sept. 1 and possibly a month earlier.

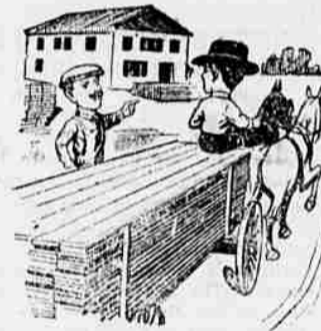
