WALLOWA COUNTY CITIZENS GIVE LIBERALLY.

Representatives of Joseph, Enterprise and Lostine met in Masonic hall, Enterprise, Sunday afternoon, and divided up the county into four districts, to be worked by the four towns. Wallowa was expected to send a delegation to the meeting, but missed connections and was not represented.

In the division of territory, Joseph took all that part of the county east of Hurricane creek and south of the Innaha road. Enterprise took all north of that and east of Leap. Lostine took valley territory on both sides of that city, and Leap. To Wallowa was assigned the remaining territory in the west of the county.

No auxiliary had been formed at the time in Lostine, but all considered this highly desirable. So it was arranged that a meeting should be held there Monday night to organize, so that Lostine workers could solicit their own territory. Five persons went from Enterprise Monday night, Mrs. George Rheem, Mrs. W. B. Bach, Mrs. S. D. Keltner, Dr. C. T. Hockett and A. W. Hawkins. They found Amusement hall packed with an enthusiastic gathering. Mr. Hawkins and Dr. Hockett spoke and the auxiliary was organized with about 80 members as a starter, surely a splendid showing.

J. F. Farrell was chosen chairman of the branch; Marcia Woods, vice-chairman; Mrs. Worstell, secretary; Mrs. Jay Lewis, treasurer; Mrs. S. B. Williamson, chairman of the finance committee. With this start, the Lostine workers went at their task with a hearty good will that presaged large returns.

In Joseph, F. H. Gaulke agreed to raise \$1000, or a third of the town's apportionment, all by himself. He said yesterday that the campaign was proceeding swimmingly; there was nothing to it. Two-thirds of the total had been raised by the committee with hardly an effort.

As Enterprise has more to raise, the suggestion of the state officers have been followed and a large corps of workers chosen. They met Monday night in Fraternal hall and received preliminary instructions, partaking of a delightful dinner served by the Eastern Star. Workers meet for lunch at noon daily in the same hall, the Pythian Sisters serving Tuesday; the P. E. O. Sisterhood, on Wednesday; the Rebekahs Thursday and Enterprise Literary Club Friday. All will go to the court house grounds on Saturday. At these gatherings the workers compare notes and the meetings serve to keep all alert and interested.

The captains got a late start, not getting well under way until yesterday, but before night most of them had got about half their total subscription. A plan that has been adopted elsewhere is under way with the force of the East Oregon Lumber company. Every employee will be asked to give one day's pay to the fund. This will raise about \$1,000. Two of the company's representatives are on the executive committee or on soliciting teams.

The captains are A. W. Hawkins, Jan Macdonald, Jay H. Dobbin, S. I. Burnaugh, C. H. Zurcher, J. A. Burleigh, Carl Roe, Dr. Hockett, and H. Lee Carlton. The territory has been divided up among them, and each has received cards bearing the names of most of the persons in his territory. Mr. Asher has the Innaha and Zumwalt and will get into the country today and work it thoroughly. Others will go to Chico and the country this side of and beyond that.

For the north end of the county a vigorous campaign has been mapped out, under direction of Dr. Hockett. Members of the church at Flora have consented to give over Sunday morning's service to the Red Cross. A large delegation from Enterprise will be there, with the best speakers obtainable, who will explain the work of the Red Cross, and prepare for the solicitation of funds. Then the committee will get to work, spending the rest of Sunday and most of Monday in the field.

They will return in time for the final dinner, next Monday night, when last reports will be made and cards turned in. From the progress made already and the spirit with which the task has been undertaken, there is no reason to doubt that the county will do its part fully.
