DESTRUCTIVE TENANT MAKES MILLIONAIRE

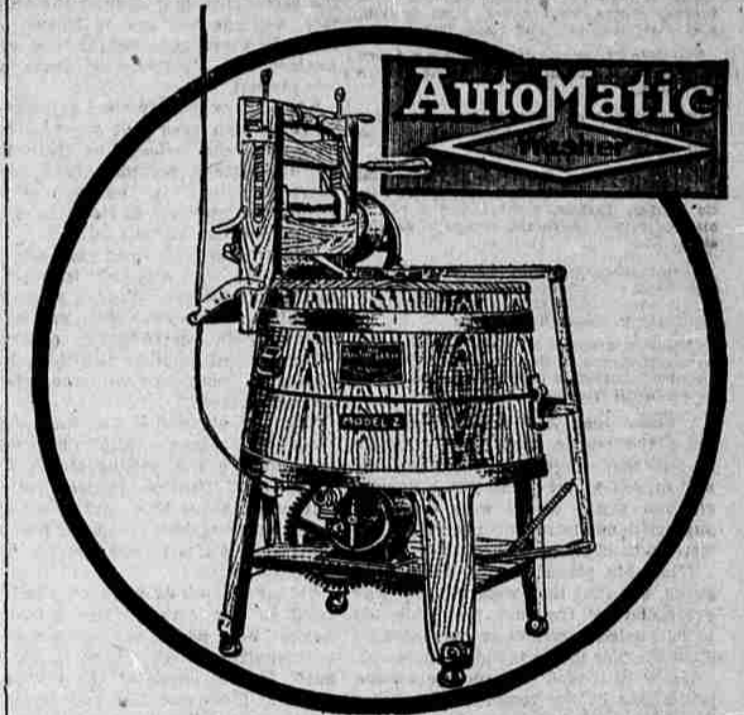
