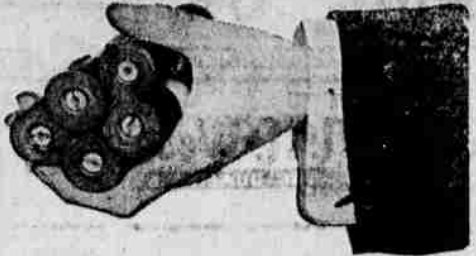

Land Bank Gets Busy. Turner Oliver, registrar and attorney of the Federal Land bank at Spokane writes the Observer: "I have been expecting to write you some interesting news about the progress of the bank, but have been

working very hard getting the affairs down to running order, and a little later will send you a communication telling the good people of La Grande something about what the bank is doing and how it will affect the farmers' interest throughout these four states. At present we have applications on hand and approved for over \$2,000,000 of loans and arrangements have already been made by the Federal Land Board by which we will have a continual supply of money from the issuance of bonds as fast as loans are made in series of \$250,000. Many of the Loan associations have been slow, and in some cases the bank is getting the blame, but the bank is placing loans immediately upon the approval of the titles offered by the applicants."

Pasco Has Stockyards.

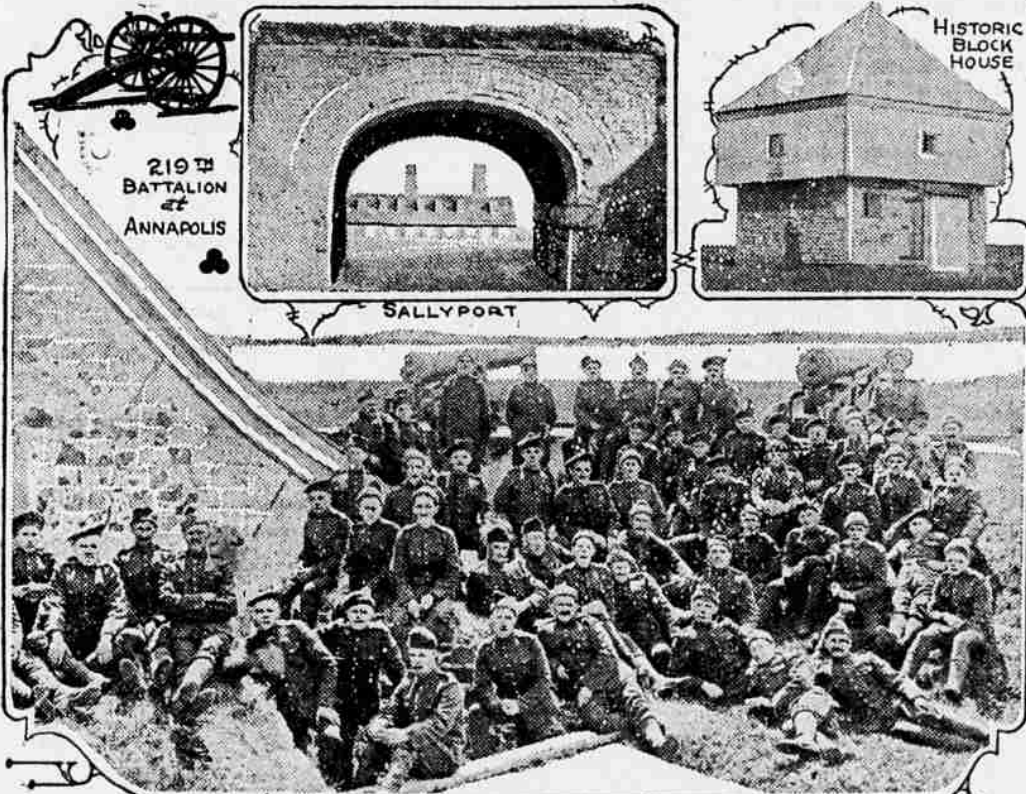
Pasco, Wash., June 25.—(United

NEW LEVIES ARE DRILLING ON A FIELD OF TWENTY BATTLES



Railway men say battlefields will be popular this summer. Nobody can travel to the scene of the Licking of the Hohenzollerns, so American history will have to supply the thrills right here at home.

Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia, ties with St. Augustine, Florida, for being the oldest settlement on the continent. It looks peaceful enough to have been founded by William Jennings Bryan, but it has suffered twenty attacks, ten of them regular sieges—by the Indians, the English, the Americans and the French. The big green lawn with the queer

grass-covered banks and the dinky little eighteenth century cannon with their prim piles of shot, was the pride of Vauban, the great French engineer who drew the plans in the days when the Acadians lived in the pink valley with the blue river in the north, and the British used to raid round at them from around Boston.

Today we can wander from the officers' quarters where a picturesque old British sergeant lives with his cat, to the ancient powder magazines, the sallyport, the furnaces where chain shot was heated—two little iron balls held together by a couple of links.

There is a Black Hole underground prison too, and if the girls are quite brave—and pretty—the sergeant will turn the enormous key in the lock and let them imagine they're Lady Latour, who fought D'Aulnay de Charnisay, the pirate chief who owned this very fort three centuries ago.

Canada has just about finished raising her promised 500,000 soldiers for the Allies. The Nova Scotia Camp is at Aldershot, not far from Annapolis Royal, and often the warriors of today camp out on the historic battlefields of other times, when the line-up was different, and French and English were on opposite sides of the game.
