Portland, June 25.—(United Press)—Excluding Portland, Oregon has raised four hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-five dollars, according to totals compiled this afternoon. The final total will pass the half million mark.

The government has decided to announce a conference to deal with the future composition of the House of Lords. This conference

will also discuss the relations of the two houses of parliament.

Today's War Recipe.

(From Britain's Official Win-the-War Cook Book)

Home-Made Maize Bread — One quartern of flour, one pound of fine maize meal or maize flour, three-quarters of a pint of tepid water, one gill of skim milk, three-quarters of an ounce of yeast, one teaspoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of moist sugar. Mix the two flours, cover with paper, and put into a fairly slack oven for about an hour. Put into a basin with the sale, and make a well in the center; cream the yeast and sugar, and stir in gradually the milk and water, previously warmed a little; pour into the center of the flour, mix a little flour from the sides, and work into a smooth paste. Cover with a cloth, and allow to stand in a warm place for about twenty minutes; when it has well risen which will be seen when the surface is covered with bubbles, work in the rest of the flour with the hand, and knead well for ten minutes; put it again into a warm place, and allow it to stand for an hour and a half. Take up the dough, put it on a floured board, shape into loaves, or place into floured tins, cut or prick the surface, and bake from one hour and a half to two hours, according to the size of the loaf.
