COLLEGE WOMEN NEEDED IN THE FIELD OF NURSING

Washington, June 27.—(Special)—
The war crisis has brought an urgent
call for college women in the field of
nursing. The rush of nurses to Eu-
rope, which is steadily increasing
since this country's entry into the
struggle, has drawn hundreds of the
most highly trained and skilled pro-
fessional nurses from American hos-
pitals and from the homes of the sick
poor here. The nursing profession
feels that the situation has reached
a serious crisis and to meet it an
emergency committee on nursing has
been found with Miss Ella Phillips
Crandall, of the National Organiza-
tion for Public Health Nursing as
secretary.

As a first step this committee has
arranged with several high class
schools of nursing to give a year of
credit to college women who have
taken a certain number of hours in
science. Letters have been sent to
the heads of all the women's col-
leges in the country explaining this
offer and asking for a list of this
year's graduates in order that they
may be circularized. The Committee
is also organizing a campaign among
this year's high school graduates.
