1.—The Professional Woman—
Only the very best trained graduate nurses, with known executive ability, stand any chance of reaching the base war hospitals with the first American armies.
The Red Cross now has an enrollment sufficient to care for the war-nursing requirements of an army of 1,000,000.
2.—The Non-Professional Woman—Volunteer.
Nurses aids are now being selected. Their duties are very hard—largely preparation of food in diet kitchens, food for the hospital staff, general hospital work.
The aids are being selected from those possessing certificates in the the Red Cross Bureau of Nursing already have such classes.
Classes can be started anywhere by from ten to twenty women. Write to the Red Cross Bureau of Nursing Service, Washington, D. C.
Non-professional women volunteers should see officers of their local chapters for direction and advice.

Today's War Recipe.
(From Britian's Official Win-the-War Cook Book.)
Barley Bread—Twelve ounces of barley flour, eight ounces of whole meal, eight ounces of flour, one teaspoonful of salt, one teaspoonful of castor sugar, half an ounce of yeast, three gills of tepid water. Mix the flour and salt and place in a warm basin. Make a well in the center of the flour. Cream the yeast and sugar in a small warm basin, pour in the tepid water, stir, and then pour in the center of the flour. Cover and let rise for three-quarters of an hour, then mix in, and knead well on a floured board. Divide the dough, and put it into greased tins, then leave until it rises to the top of the tins (it will take half an hour). Bake in an oven for from three-quarters of an hour to an hour. When the bread is baked the loaf sounds hollow if tapped underneath.

Therefore the Baker district will have subscribed 80 per cent over its \$20,000 allotment.

OF INTEREST TO WOMEN.
Cherries.
Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 27.—(Special)—Take fresh, ripe cherries; wash and pit; pack the jar as full as you can; add the boiling syrup made by using 3 quarts of sugar to 2 quarts water and boiled sufficiently to dissolve all the sugar. Cover and sterilize in hot water bath 16 minutes.
Salted cherries to be used as a relish—Take perfect cherries; do not pit or stem; pack the jars with the cherries and to a quart jar add 1 tablespoon salt and 1-4 cup vinegar. Fill the jars to overflowing with cold water and seal. If the sour cherries are used you need not add vinegar. Cherries may be sun preserved the same as strawberries.
There are many ways that canned cherries may be used aside from sauce. They are very good in salads. Cherries, apples, pineapple, and nuts are a good combination for salad. Cherries may also be stuffed with filbert nuts and used as salad.
Cherry Roll.
2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 egg, 1 cup milk.
Make as for biscuits and roll thin so that the length is twice its width. Spread cherries over this, keeping within an inch of the edge. Roll like jelly cake, pressing the ends firmly so that the fruit will not escape. Place roll on one side of the baking pan, pour over and around it 1 cup sugar, 2 cups of hot juice from the canned cherries, and 1 tablespoon butter. Bake, basting frequently. Add more water as needed. Serve with its own sauce.—Sarah L. Lewis, Assistant Professor of Domestic Science at O. A. C.
