WAR MAKES IDLE OSWEGO IRON PLANT BUSY

Portland, Ore., June 27.—(United Press)—The Oswego plant of the Oregon Iron & Steel company, idle since 1894, today is being put into shape for immediate use by William Pigott, of Seattle, the new owner of the works. If his present plans mature, the plant will be turning out pig iron within the next few days. He said today improvements to the plant would probably cost \$100,000. Iron ore will probably be imported from the west coast of South America, but it is also likely that northwest ore will be tried out. The manufacture of pig iron will be a big thing for steel shipbuilding on the Pacific coast, it is declared.

Ashland Is To Have Big Time On Fourth

Ashland, Ore., June 27.—(Special)—Ashland is planning to stage one of the greatest celebrations in the west on July 3, 4 and 5, and the entire Rogue River Valley is joining in the project and expects to entertain eighty thousand visitors on those days. Special trains will run from Portland, Coos Bay and northern Cali-

fornia.

The chief feature of the Ashland Hyiu Hehe, which, by the way, is Chinook Indian jargon for "heap big good time," is the Rogue River Roundup, which promises to be one of the greatest western shows ever staged. Six world's champion riders, bulldoggers and ropers, practically all of the Pendleton winners of last year, will be included in the two hundred cowboys and cowgirls from eastern Oregon, southeastern Oregon, northern California, southern California, Texas and Arizona who will compete. Six relay strings, including Rube Fisher's Pendleton winners, Roy Anderson's Los Angeles string, two Klamath strings from the Rogue River Valley will make the relay one of the most exciting events of the roundup. Lee Caldwell, Jackson Sundown, Fred and John Spain, George Weir, Dell Blanchett, Sid Seales, Katherine Wilkes, Ella Mayfield, Josephine Sherry are a few

of the top-notchers who will participate. Competition between the various sections will lend a sensational interest.

Many other features will make the Hyiu Hehe a big time in every sense of the word. Scores of patriotic spectacles, parades miles in length, unfurling of the largest flag in Oregon, day and night fireworks, continuous band concerts by six bands including the Portland Police Band, dancing, swimming at two sulphur natatoriums, confetti battles and the attractions of sixty acres of shady Lithia park with its four mineral waters, free auto camp and picnic grounds are only a few of the things which will make a visit to Ashland a memorable one.
