A Word of Hope.

Doctors and laymen both fear the recurrence of infantile paralysis with the warm weather. In the June Woman's Home Companion, Dr. Roger H. Dennet, while making no prediction as to what we may expect in the way of an epidemic, speaks a word of hope to those whose children have suffered from the disease.

"So long as any improvement whatever is taking place in the child's condition, we may feel encouraged, and continue any necessary treatment with unabated enthusiasm, for, even after six months or a year, improvement in the muscles continues to take place.

"On the other hand, when no improvement whatever has taken place, for instance when the limb is absolutely paralyzed, we would be inclined, after six months of faithful treat-

ment, to give up the battle so far as anything in the way of an absolute cure is concerned. There is one hopeful outlook, however, and that is that when once the damage is done, when once the acute stage of the disease has subsided, it is perfectly certain that no further paralysis of the muscles will take place."

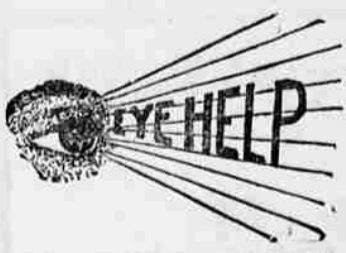
