New York, June 30.—(Special)—White caps on the chests of the fashionable waves are now numerous to be seen. Reared aloft on the crests of fashionable devotees, nautically fitting that the favorite of them should be dubbed Titian hair.

A jaunty little copy of the mammoth shanter of white satin braided with a white ecuyache braid with a loopy center, white falling from the fullness of the tam also flops rakishly. What more inspiring display of the national colors could one's heart desire than a military cap of white satin with a white straw visor poised above a pair of blue eyes atop a mass of Titian hair?

A cunning little round hat of white satin has its brim rolled up all around with an inch quilling of the white satin standing up on top of that. A French fold of the satin around the crown with a pump bow in front is the only other adornment.

Another similar model of white straw has an upstanding banding of inch high white quills instead of the satin quilling and yet another has the same effect accomplished with white wheat.

AUTOMOBILE NOTES.

Storage Batteries Cannot Be Treated Like Dry Cells.

"Not infrequently, motorists allow their storage batteries to become almost totally discharged and, in some cases, nearly dry," says Mr. Leighton of the Leighton Welding and Battery Station.

"Too many motorists are apt to treat the storage battery as they would treat a dry cell—they have the impression that there is nothing to do but use the battery until it is exhausted. Consequently they pay no attention to it, as long as it does the work, with the result that by the time it becomes inoperative, the battery is very seriously harmed.

"It should be remembered that dry cells are not intended to be recharged or used again while a storage battery, by virtue of their electro-chemical nature, may be used continuously throughout their life, by recharging from a source of electric supply.

"The inside of the storage battery consists of cells of which are suspended plates of a chemical composition

covered with a solution of acid and distilled water.

"The natural action of these chemicals through use of the battery, is to combine—the acid of the solution combining with the material of the plates.

"The battery is recharged by passing electric current through it which reverses this natural action by expelling the acid from the plates or, effect, separating the solution from the plates. After the recharge, the chemical immediately start combining again or following their natural action. It is this action which causes the battery to give off electric current until the action has ceased or the chemical combination has been affected.

"In other words chemical composition, which naturally combine are separated by electric current from without and the action that follows produces the current which is obtained from the battery.

"Thus, electric current is not 'stored' in a battery but simply passed through it to bring about a chemical action. A battery is constantly starving to get back to its original, or discharged itself even when not in active use.

"A storage battery should never be allowed to completely discharge itself. It is considered discharged when the acid solution in the cells, kept to the proper level, shows a specific gravity test of 1.150—which means that most of the acid has combined with the plates. At this stage the battery may still sluggishly do its work, but it has about lost its energy and the battery should be immediately recharged. If this is not done, the plates, no longer being able to resist the acid solution, will begin to rapidly deteriorate and become difficult, if not impossible, of recharging.

"Generators, furnished on most automobiles, usually keep the battery pretty well charged, but various things can happen to the battery, as the generator and electrical equipment, which will eventually 'draw' current or cause considerable expense.

Therefore, to have the battery recharged regularly by some battery or electrical system corrected before they be-
