A Historic Printing Press.—Says the La Grande Gazette: "The press on which the Gazette is printed is a historical relic. It was brought to the state as we think by T. J. Dryer, about 1850, and the first number of The Oregonian was printed on it. Mr. Dryer was the founder, and for many

years the proprietor of that sheet, and during all that time it was printed on the present Gazette press. When that paper was enlarged, after passing into the hands of Mr. Pittock, this press was sold to a company of gentlemen in Vancouver, and the Vancouver Register was printed on it. It was afterwards sold to M. H. Abbott, who printed a paper at Pendleton on it, and afterward at The Dalles. By him it was transferred to the Gazette Publishing Company and for nearly a year and a half the Gazette has issued from it. It is still in good order, though it has done nearly or quite 30 years' work in Oregon."

(The Gazette is slightly in error. Mr. Dryer brought from San Francisco an old Ramage and some second-hand material, on which the first number of The Oregonian was issued in December, 1850. The next year a new Washington press and dress came from New York, and the Ramage was sent to Olympia where the first paper on the Sound was issued from it—the Olympian. The Washington press was displaced by a power press in 1862, and was sold to go to Walla Walla, from whence it was taken to Idaho City. We believe the first paper in Idaho, the Boise News, was printed on it. Where it is now we cannot say.)

Miscellaneous.

The La Grande Gazette office, good will and material has been sold to Mr. Shedden F. Wilson, who will take possession and conduct the publication of the paper from the first of May next. Mr. Wilson is a man of considerable newspaper experience and is said to be eminently qualified to fill the position he is about to assume. For a year or more the Gazette has been owned and conducted under the management of Messrs. Snodgrass & Miner, sterling business men and merchants of the town, not as a pecuniary consideration, but in order to sustain and continue the paper until it could be placed in the hands of a competent and experienced newspaper man. The Gazette under the management of Snodgrass & Miner has attained a character of respectability and good standing that some of the newspapers in Eastern Oregon might well envy, and would do well to pattern after. The true character of a newspaper may be determined by the personal integrity and good standing in society of its editor and publisher, and we are glad to recognize the Gazette as an honorable high-toned journal, and wish it continued prosperity.—Boise City Statesman.

Dam Not Dynamited.

Baker, July 2.—(United Press) —Through investigation of the washing out of the Kilmaque reservoir dam, revealed the fact to visitors to the scene that the disaster was wholly the result of natural causes and not caused by dynamiting as some of the residents firmly believed, and to a certain extent still believe. It is also revealed that only a small portion of the water in the reservoir went out, the 12-foot crown above the original dam being the only portion carried away by the heavy weight of the water. It was also proven on checking up the losses yesterday that the first accounts were greatly overdrawn.

Hinkle have received word from their son, Dale Hinkle, at the Presidio Training Camp, San Francisco, that he has received a commission as second lieutenant in the Officers' Reserve Corps. Mr. Hinkle has been a student at Reed College, Portland, for the past two years. He was without previous military experience, except what little he had during the past year at the college. His letters have indicated that the course of training has been pleasant after the first hardships were off.
