platform has ever heard Dr. Bohn's forte lies in the clearness of his reasoning, the timeliness of his theme, and the abundance of knowledge about the subject in hand. He approached his subject from the viewpoint generally overlooked. Rather than going into the fine analysis of the issue, he dwelt upon the war from the viewpoint of one who mingled with the common people.

Mr. Bohn was formerly war correspondent in Europe for the New York Times. Mr. Bohn's subject was "The Mind of Germany" and his address showed that he had a complete mastery of the subject. He analyzed the mental attitude of Germany toward the war with startling clearness and gave his audience an insight into the views of the German people on the war that contained much that was valuable and interesting. That the German people are in the dark as to the issues and progress of the war was made clear by Mr. Bohn.
