Letters From The Front

(Letter from Lee Bradway of the U. S. Field Artillery to Mrs. A. S. Bradway, of La Grande.)

Schofield Barracks, Honolulu, H. T., June 13, 1917.

Dear Mother:—We arrived in Hon-

olulu today all O. K. and went into quarantine. If no one gets sick in nine days we will go to our regiments I have been assigned to the first.

We left Frisco on the stroke of 12 n. on June 5th and by 5 p. m. I was sea sick. I was only sick about 12 hours though. After the first day out the water and air got warm steadily until it was tropical.

This morning when I woke up, Diamond Head was rising out of the water and by 9 a. m. we were up to the dock in Honolulu and disembarked almost immediately. We then marched

through the streets to the Oahu railway where we loaded and went out to the barracks, which are of canvas and 27 miles from town. The railway is narrow gauge and makes about 19 miles per hour.

The government owns this valley. I don't know its name yet. The F. A. has target practice three times per week, so I will be pretty busy after I get out of quarantine. We saw fields of rice, sugar cane, pineapples and groves of coconuts and bananas on the train.

Everything seems to be five cents

here. Pineapples 5c, each, bananas 5c per dozen, oranges 5c each, coconuts 5c, and pies 5c.

We can get all we want after today when they open the canteen in our camp, for we can't leave camp now.

This Hawaiian climate is great stuff; it rains enough so that it don't get hot. Two weeks ago it rained twenty-two inches in one night. The men said that the ocean turned upside down on the island.

There are 25,000 men in this valley, and every branch of service is represented forming a complete unit so that we could hold the island against a very large force for we could entrench in the mountains.

I will be assigned to my battery after I get out of quarantine.

Where is Willie now, I am anxious to know. His best mose is to get a job making shells in a munition factory. I am sending you a picture of Pt. Blint camp. My address is: 1st U. S. Field Artillery Rgt. Unassigned, Schofield Barracks, Honolulu, H. T.

Be sure to get all that address on because if you don't it will cause great delay. When the P. O. sees the 1st U. S. Field Art. Rgt. Unassigned they will know I am in quarantine and will send it right out. Well I have told you all the early news. I will write again soon.
