ment will be called for, and how extensively the services of American lumbermen can be utilized to advantage.

One of the staff officers of the regiment, Captain Barrington Moore, is with Mr. Graves for the purpose of arranging for its prompt assumption of the specific duties to which it will be assigned when it is landed in France. While organized on military lines, the work of the regiment will be industrial, not combatant. It will operate in the woods behind the armies, getting out timbers, ties and lumber required for military purposes.

The recruiting of the regiment which has already been asked for is being pushed by the Forest Service and is said to be advancing rapidly. The listing officers for this regiment are as follows:

Forest Supervisor Seitz, Eugene, Oregon; Forest Supervisor Erickson, Medford, Oregon; Forest Supervisor Hastings, Bend, Oregon; Forest Supervisor Evans, Baker, Oregon; Forest Supervisor Smith, Seattle, Washington; Forest Supervisor Fromme, Olympia, Washington; Forest Supervisor Park, Bellingham, Washington; Forest Supervisor Sylvester, Leavenworth, Washington.

Applicants must be white, between the ages of 18 and 40, and must pass the regular army physical examination. Men subject to conscription will discharge their obligations by enlisting in this regiment.

Health Bodies Aid Red Cross

New York, July 9.—(Special)—The American Red Cross in organizing its war relief by co-ordinating the health and philanthropic activities throughout the nation is going to have the advantage of the machinery of 1500 public health bodies of the country. The National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis has affiliated organizations in every state in the Union in the form of bodies of trained workers thoroughly conversant with the conditions with which the Red Cross must deal. The machinery is freely offered for the organizing and promoting of local Red Cross campaigns or in promoting Red Cross work in any other form that may be determined.

The organization of state anti-tuberculosis associations were formed in South Carolina, Tennessee, New Hampshire, Vermont, Utah, Nevada, Montana, Wyoming, Florida, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona and Kentucky. The machinery of all these organizations is now made available for Red Cross use. This is a particularly valuable asset it is pointed out in view of the fact that these associations are well organized and run on a thoroughly business basis. Nearly 300 city and county associations employ paid secretaries and staffs.

How The War Came To America

(Issued by The Committee on Public Information—The Secretary of State, The Secretary of War, The Secretary of the Navy, George Creel Washington, D. C. June 25, 1917.)

Our second great tradition in international relations has been our persistent effort to secure a stable and equitable agreement of the nations upon such a maritime code as would assure to all the world a just freedom of the seas.

This effort was born of our vital need. For although it was possible for the Republic to keep aloof from the nineteenth century disputes that rent the Continent of Europe, we could not be indifferent to the way in which war was conducted at sea. In those early years of our national life, when we were still but a few communities ranged along the Atlantic coast, we were a seafaring people. At a time when our frontiersmen had not yet reached the Mississippi, the fame of our daring clipper ships had spread to all the Seven Seas. So while we could watch the triumphant march and the tragic countermarch of Napoleon's grand army with detached indifference, his Continental Blockade and the British Orders in Council at once affected the lives of our citizens intimately and disastrously.

So it was in the case of the Barbary pirates. We had no interest in the land quarrels and civil wars of the Barbary States, but we fought them for obstructing the freedom of the seas.

And in the decades ever since, although the imagination of our people has been engrossed in the immense labor of winning the West, our Department of State has never lost sight of the compelling interest that we have upon the seas, and has constantly striven to gain the assent of all nations to a maritime code which should be framed and enforced by a joint responsibility. Various watchwords have arisen in this long controversy. We have urged the inviolability of private property at sea, we have asked for a liberal free list and a narrow definition of contraband. But our main insistence has not been on any such details. One salient idea has guided our diplomacy. The law of the sea must be founded not on might but on right and a common accord, upon a code binding all alike, which can not be changed or set aside by the will of any one nation. Our ideal has been not a weakening but a strengthening of legal restraint by the free will and agreement of all. We have asked nothing for ourselves that we do not ask for the whole world. The seas will never be free, in our American meaning, until all who sail thereon have had a voice in framing sea laws. The just governance of the seas must rest on the consent of the governed. No other question of international polity has found the great powers

more divided. But in our insistence on this fundamental principle, we have been strengthened by the support of many other countries. At times we have had the support of Great Britain. No one of our Secretaries of State has more clearly defined our ideal than has Viscount Grey, recently British Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. None of our statesmen has ever gone so far as he in advocating limitation of the rights of belligerents on the sea. It was on his initiative that the international naval conference was summoned to London in 1909, and it was under his guidance that the eminent international lawyers and diplomats and admirals who gathered there drew up the Declaration of London.

While there were in that Declaration sections that did not quite meet our approval and that we should have liked to amend, the document was from our point of view a tremendous step in advance. For although, like any effort to concisely formulate the broad principles of equity, it did not wholly succeed in its purpose, it was at least an honest attempt to arrive at an agreement on a complete international code of sea law, based upon mutual consent and not to be altered by any belligerent in the heat of the conflict.

But the Declaration of London was not ratified by the British Parliament, for the point of view prevailing then in England was that a power dependent almost wholly upon its navy for protection could not safely accept further limitations upon action at sea unless there were compensating limitations on land powers. And this latter concession Germany consistently refused to make. The conference therefore came to naught. And the London Declaration having been rejected by the strongest maritime power, its endorsement was postponed by all the other countries involved. Our motives, however, remained unchanged; and our Government persisted in its purpose to secure a general ratification either of this declaration or of some similar maritime code.

HEAD OF FOREST SERVICE NOW IN FRANCE

Portland, July 9.—(Special)—Announcement of the arrival of Henry S. Graves, Chief of the U. S. Forest Service, in Paris has led the Department of Agriculture to explain that Mr. Graves has gone abroad to make arrangements for the forest work which the American army engineers will undertake in France in connection with the military operations of the allied forces.

Because of the opportunity for service by this country in woods work incidental to the war which the request of the British Government for the sending of a forest regiment was believed to present, Mr. Graves has been granted leave of absence from his position as head of the Forest Service and has received a commission as Major in the Reserve Engineer Corps. He has not been assigned to any command, but is acting under instructions, it is stated, to proceed to France in order to learn on the ground in advance just what conditions will need to be met, what equip-
