Train Dispatchers Show Their Patriotism

Uncle Sam can count upon the patriotic support of the train dispatchers, according to Harry Swarts, who has just returned from the thirtieth annual convention of the Train Dispatchers' association of America held in Fresno. There the following resolution was adopted unanimously:
"Appreciating the force and truth of the remarks made by Mr. C. J. McDonald, assistant superintendent of transportation for the Southern Pacific, before us in convention assembled, be it
"RESOLVED, on behalf of the members of this association and, we

believe, in agreement with the sentiment of all train dispatchers of these United States, that we fully recognize the duty of all members of the train dispatching fraternity to perform fully and loyally our share in the work that may devolve upon us of doing whatever lies in our power in the railway service and in the service of our common country to achieve a victorious war, and

"RESOLVED further that we pledge ourselves to devotion to the cause of our country and unremitting effort to attain every possible efficiency in that branch of the railway service to which we are assigned, and
"RESOLVED further that we call upon all train dispatchers to unite with us in carrying out this resolution. When our country calls for the best service of its citizens we shall not be found wanting."
