EVERY REGISTERED MAN SHOULD LEARN HIS NUMBER

(From the War Census Bureau.) Portland, Or., July 11.—(Special)—For his own protection, as well as to facilitate the progress of the draft, every man in Oregon who registered for military service should make it a point to learn the new number of his registration card.

These new numbers are different from those on the green (or blue) registration certificates.

True, the number on a man's certificate is the same as that written on his registration card at the time he registered. But under orders from the War Department, the numbers of all the cards have been changed in the past two weeks.

The new numbers are written on the cards in red ink. They run by counties, instead of only by precincts. The county will be the unit of the draft and these new numbers are to be used in the drawings.

The first drawing will be made at Washington within the next few days. The numbers drawn will be announced to the press and also telegraphed to the Adjutant General. The Adjutant General will consult the files in his office, which contain duplicates of all the registration cards from the state, ascertain the names of the men belonging to the numbers, and notify the county board.

These county boards will mail notifications to the men who have been called in their respective counties. These notifications will direct them to appear for physical examination at a date set, which must be within seven days.

It can readily be seen how important it is for each man to know his own number. Failure to receive a mail notification will not be accepted as an excuse for not appearing for examination. If he knows his number, a man by consulting a list of the num-

bers drawn can quickly learn whether his own number is among them or not. Complete lists of the new numbers

have been posted by each county exemption board in the various county courthouses. Many newspapers also are publishing lists. In any case, be sure you learn your new number and memorize it. Get your number today.

These numbers are being run in The Observer as a matter of public record and for the convenience of those registered.
