WRITES A LETTER TO THE OBSERVER

EXPRESSES REGRET THAT H. E. COOLIDGE'S HEALTH PREVENTS CONTINUING IN SERVICE.

MADE AN ABLE OFFICER

Bad Case of Blood Poisoning in His Foot Causes Resignation of Popular La Grande Officer—Ralph Huron Is Making Good and Will Probably Get a Captain's Commission—Ted Ludlam Is In San Francisco Working for a Big Concern and Driving a High-Powered Auto.

San Francisco, July 14, 1917.—Dear Mr. Letter: I regret very much to learn that Brother Ed Coolidge has tendered his resignation from the Reserve Officers' Training Camp and will return home next week. Brother Coolidge has been disabled for over a month with a bad case of blood poisoning in his foot, and although he gets around on his feet, he is not yet entirely recovered, and fears that it may be necessary to have another incision. Under the circumstances, having lost so much of the course, he felt constrained to submit his resignation.

I am profoundly disappointed, as there is no doubt that Brother Coolidge has the stuff in him for the making of an accomplished officer. He and his family will motor home in a beautiful new Buick car which he has purchased and plan to leave San Francisco next Thursday.

Ralph Huron is making good and we are confident that he will get a captain's commission at the end of the course. He has a thorough command of the essentials, lots of good military horse sense, besides many personal qualities that insure his success. I met "Ted" Ludlam here today. He is employed by a big firm of some kind here and expects to make this his permanent home. His company furnishes him a big super-six automobile, and it is said that he has already increased the hazard in life insurance to very alarming extent. In Frisco it is strictly against the law to drive less than 40 miles per hour on the more crowded thoroughfares, and unless one runs down a certain number of pedestrians a year he is in danger of having his license revoked.
