Must Be Physically Examined.

Portland, July 21.—(Special)—A question frequently asked in connection with the coming draft is whether a man absent from his home county, either out of the state or in another county of the state, can arrange to save the expense of returning to his home county for physical examination, etc., if he is called, by appearing before the exemption board of the county in which he happens to be. He can, but only under the following conditions:

Immediately after receiving notification from his home exemption board to appear for physical examination, the absentee should write the board, fully explaining the circumstances and asking permission to present himself before the board in the county where he is situated.

The War Department draft regulations authorize his home board, if it is satisfied with his statement, to give such permission. He should not appear before the other board, however, until he has first been notified by his home board and has obtained the necessary permission. The board before which he appears will have full jurisdiction over his case.
