This is the season of the year when newest styles in cooks and the latest effects in second maids and waitresses is agitating the female mind much more than the dernier cri in bonnets and blouses.

For Tilly has begun to feel the yearn for the Great Outdoors. She hears the sad sea waves calling and the whisper of the pines.

For ten years I have spent my sizzling summers in my city flat. No one ever said to me "Wilt thou fly with me to some cool grove?" so I just had to stay put and do all wilting right in my happy little home. Not so Maggie, Minna or whoever happened to be breaking my china at the moment. As soon as the first signs of Spring were noticed they gave their notice. THE FORUM

An Article Prepared By Request From the "National Anti-Vivisection Magazine for April, 1917.

La Grande, July 20.—(To the Editor)—I am no medical man and don't know much about medicine, but do claim to know as much as the ordinary dub who isn't a doctor, but I am a strong seeker after the truth and nothing pleases me more than to throw the truth in the face of some disbeliever or some person who refuses to read and use his head. Therefore I ask that you will kindly reprint the article as above indicated: It follows: "Do you know that infantile paralysis often follows vaccination? (See report of investigation of 54 cases of illness and death from vaccination, by James A. Loyster, in New York State during 1914; and statistics.)

Do you know that investigations of the epidemics of 1907 and 1916 produced strong evidence that they were started from vaccine virus? (See New York Herald for Sept. 28, 1916.)

Do you know that the United States government proved that the epidemics of foot and mouth disease, which swept this country in 1902-03, 1908 and 1914, were started from vaccine virus? (See Bureau of Animal Industry, Circular No. 147, and Farmer's Bulletin No. 666.)

Do you know that hundreds of United States soldiers on the Texas border have suffered from paratyphoid fever caused by typhoid serum, and that it occurs only in persons who have been inoculated?

Do you know that the cases of typhoid fever among the Spanish-American war soldiers in 1898 (before the discovery of typhoid vaccine) amounted to 8.8 per cent? (See U. S. Army Reports.)

Do you know that when the 14th regiment, N. Y. N. G., U. S. arrived at Camp Whitman from the Texas border the cases of paratyphoid, together with the healthy, active carriers, amounted to 17 per cent? Double that of 1898! (See New York Health Department Reports.)

Do you know that paratyphoid fever is human hog cholera? (Appleton's Medical Dictionary, Jan. 1916, defines it: "Paratyphoid—Resembling typhoid fever or the typhoid bacillus, P. bacillus—An organism belonging to the hog cholera group, which causes paratyphoid fever.")

Do you know that nearly 70,000 British soldiers (all vaccinated for typhoid immunity) were sent home from the Gallipoli Peninsula with tuberculosis? And as a result compulsory vaccination was abolished. See reports of speeches in the House of Parliament.)

Do you know that tuberculosis causes more deaths than any other disease except heart troubles? (See U. S. Mortality Statistics.)

Do you know that New York City statistics show that cancer has increased there fully 225 per cent since 1870? (See Board of Health Reports.)

Do you know that cancer and tuberculosis are treated by specialists to blood debasement from vaccination? (See writings of Sir Robert Bell, for 43 years cancer specialist in London; and many others.)

Do you know that, contrary to the general belief, the wide use of diphtheria antitoxin has neither lowered the number of cases, nor the deaths? (See report of special inquiry by the New York City Health Department. Published in the New York World for June 12, 1916.)

Do you know that the Flexner serum for cerebro-spinal meningitis was injected into fifteen children in the City Hospital of Cincinnati, Ohio, and that fourteen died within five minutes? (See full report in the Cincinnati Enquirer for March 18, 1914.)

Do you know that from 1902 to 1908, and very probably to 1914, thousands of school children were vaccinated under compulsion with virus containing germs of foot and mouth disease, with a resultant debasement of the blood which may in after years, result in complications of the most serious nature? (See Bureau of Animal Industry, Circular No. 147 pp. 24 and 26.)

Do you know that there were no

deaths from smallpox in 1915 in New Jersey, while there were at least three deaths of children directly due to vaccination? (See newspaper reports and report of the State Board of Health.)

Do you know that the recurrence of the outbreak of foot and mouth disease in 1915 was due to infected anti-hog cholera serum? (See Report of the Bureau of Animal Industry for September 28, 1915.)

Do you know that following this discovery the Canadian government passed a law prohibiting the use of these serums? These are facts! Can you disprove them, or do you know any one who can?"

The above is the article complete. I never was vaccinated and I always preached against it, because I had read just as high authorities against it as for it and I had the right to decide for myself, and I shall never be vaccinated for anything unless forced to by government authorities.

But in spite of the fact that the modern age is rapidly doing away from drugs (and my dad is a druggist) many doctors still insist on injecting all kinds of rotten vaccine and serum into the blood when they know that any foreign object into the blood stream, no matter how it is sterilized, is absolutely against nature and she immediately puts up a fight to throw it off, hence the festering and the swollen arm and the pains, etc. She warns you by pain that it is foreign to her nature.

"SAMMIES" TO BE WELL FED.

Washington, July 23.—(United Press)—Uncle Sam's soldiers in France won't be obliged to subsist on the ordinary "beef and beans" popularly supposed to be the only army edibles.

Food contracts placed by the government show the American fighters will have four kinds of tea, coffee and plenty of granulated sugar, pickles, all sorts of peppers and spices, potatoes, onions, flour for biscuits, hard bread, cane syrup, vanilla and lemon flavorings, lard, butter, canned and dried fish, vegetables, apples and peaches.
