on a blank form you may obtain by application from the local board, within five days of the certifying and posting of your name by the local board.

File your claim with one of the following three district boards under whose jurisdiction you are regis-

tered: District Board No. 1, at Portland, comprises these counties: Multnomah (outside of Portland), City of Portland, Clatsop, Tillamook, Yamhill, Washington, Marion, Jefferson, Deschutes, Wasco, Hood River, Clackamas and Columbia.

District Board No. 2, at Eugene, comprises these counties: Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, Lincoln, Linn, Lake, Lane, Polk and Klamath.

District Board No. 3, at La Grande, comprises these counties: Harney, Malheur, Grant, Baker, Wallowa, Union, Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Sherman, Wheeler and Crook.

Finally, remember the seven penalties provided by law for false statements made for the purpose of seeking exemption or discharge.

### FORMER SLACKER DIES A HERO

London, July 5.—By Mail—(United Press)—Conscientious objector, shirker, volunteer soldier and now one of England's dead heroes—that is the war career of Henry Bellamore;

When war came Bellamore called it the Devil's invention. He fought against conscription on conscientious grounds, preferring jail to the battlefield. "If I ever see a wounded soldier fall with his crutches I won't help him up again," said Bellamore. This so aroused his neighbors at Bath that they burned him in effigy. A few weeks later he experienced a change of heart. Though exempted from the Army he volunteered. Soon he was the most popular soldier in his regiment, the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry.

Recently the former conscientious objector was killed in action, the supreme sacrifice.
