EXEMPTION BOARD

(Continued from Page One.)

—Within a few days official lists of the draft serial numbers, showing the order in which they were drawn in the lottery at Washington, will reach the various county exemption boards. Following receipt of these lists, the boards will notify the men called upon the first draft.

Until then it will not be necessary for those subject to call on the first draft to report. But as soon as they receive notification from their boards, they must report promptly on the day designated.

The first step taken by each board will be to post in a conspicuous place a list containing the names of all the men registered in its county or district, in the exact order in which they will be called on the first and all succeeding drafts. A copy of this list will also be given the press for publication.

Let it be emphasized again that this list will have not only the names of the men to be called out on the first

draft, but of every man registered, in the order in which he must be called. No person whatsoever has any authority to change this order.

Having posted this list and given a copy to the press, the board will then notify by letter every man called up on the first draft. Each man will be directed to appear before the board for physical examination on a specified date, which will be within seven days of the mailing of the notice.

Failure to receive this notice will not be accepted as an excuse for not appearing on the day set. The burden of appearing when he is called is on the man himself; there is a heavy penalty for failure to answer the call.

Remember, that regardless of whether a man intends to apply for exemption or discharge, he must appear for physical examination on the day set. He has seven days from the posting of the list and the mailing of the notice to him by the board in which to file application for exemption, and 10 more days in which to file proof.

And remember again, that no claims

for exemption because of employment in necessary industries, including agriculture, can be considered by your county exemption board.

Such a claim must be made to one of the three district appeal boards, at Portland, Eugene, or La Grande. It can only be made then after the man has passed his physical examination and been certified by the county board as called for military service and not exempt.

After you have appeared before your county exemption board and passed the physical examination, it will still be some time before you will actually be called out to join the army. You will be notified when it is time for you to report for service.

WANTED AT ONCE.
One Hundred Women to Make Surgical Dressings.
La Grande Chapter has received an order for the immediate shipment of a large supply of surgical dressings. Will you help?
The Elks lodge have tendered the use of their fine banquet hall to the classes in surgical dressings. Doctor Dora Underwood has been secured to give the lectures on the use of the dressings, materials, etc. Competent

instructors will be in charge.
While there is no charge for these lessons each member of the class will be required to make a given number of dressings, as compensation. The first lesson will be on Thursday morning from 9 to 11 o'clock, inclusive.
The following outline indicates the plan of the course:
Lesson 1.—Short talk on use of surgical supplies; materials and cost; cleanliness; sterilization; purposes and methods; accuracy in preparation, counting, importance of such; dangers from loose cotton and ravelings. Discuss bandages; show gauze bandages; materials, widths; purposes. Demonstrate making of muslin and flannel bandages. Teach wrapping.
Lesson 2.—Demonstrate cutting and making of compresses or pads; cutting, making, marking of covers; pinning, correct and incorrect methods of wrapping compresses.
Lesson 3.—Demonstrate and practice making of gauze rolls; teach wrapping; crinoline bandages.
Lesson 4.—Discuss surgical dressings with relation to special wounds and operations. Demonstrate and practice making of gauze wipes or sponges. Teach wrapping. Four-tailed bandages.
Lesson 5.—Demonstrate and practice making of gauze drains. Discuss uses of such and need of careful work. Teach wrapping. Teach making of abdominal binders or swaths.
Lesson 6.—Demonstrate and practice making of laparotomy pads with tapes. Teach wrappings. Slings or triangular bandages. T bandages.
Lesson 7.—Teach making of oakum pads and fracture pillows. Short talk on bacteria, sepsis, asepsis, and antiseptics. Teach wrappings, lining, and packing of Box 1.
Pupils should attend each lesson in order to acquire the technique.
