Must Help Russia.

New York, July 25.—"The allied countries, especially the United States who are fighting with Russia for a common cause, must help Russia and help immediately. A moment now lost cannot perhaps be made up in years."

A. J. Sack, director of the official Russian information bureau, who is thoroughly aware of Russia's present situation, voiced this appeal to the world democracies in a special statement written for the United Press.

Strike Causes Riot.

Santa Clara, Cal., July 25.—(Special)—One man was shot to death and two were seriously injured here early yesterday when striking cannery workers attempted to prevent Frank Enderlin, employed in a cannery cook room, from working.

Enderlin was stopped by strikers. One of the men, the police say, lifted

a club as if to strike Enderlin, who fired his revolver.

Paolo Bianco was instantly killed and Sabatel Rossa was shot in the leg. A group of Italians then opened fire on Enderlin, who fell with a bullet in each leg and one through the stomach. Physicians said his wounds would probably prove fatal.

More than 20 shots were fired in the riot.

No Labor Shortage.

Salem, Or., July 25.—(Special)—Early reports of a probable scarcity of labor among farmers seem to have been exaggerated, according to reports which have been received by State Labor Commissioner Hoff from the secretaries of gauges and farmers' unions.

Army Units 16,000 Men.

Washington, July 25.—(Special)—Secretary Baker confirmed today that,

in pursuance of suggestions growing out of the conferences of American Army officers with General Joffre and Bridges, tactical units of the National Army will be organized on a basis of about 16,000 men each, in place of 24,000.

Generals Joffre and Bridges explained that the smaller and more mobile division used in European armies had proved highly satisfactory.
