NAVY LEAGUE URGES ESTABLISHMENT ANTI-SUBMARINE DIVISION

Washington, July 26.—(Special)—Establishment of an anti-submarine division in the Navy Department to be charged with the formulation of plans and study of the use of inventions to combat the submarine menace is urged in statement issued at the headquarters of the Navy League of the United States here today.

The Navy Department would receive from the creation of such a division, it is believed, would prove to be a feeling of confidence on the part of the public that the task of developing a positive naval policy to strike effectively at the whole submarine power had been entrusted to certain experts, and that the administration of the Navy Department had thereby made it a special part of its program to evolve and prepare for some concrete plan of action against the submarine menace.

H. D. Akins and wife returned Monday from a trip in Canada. After Mr. Akin attends to certain business they will return.

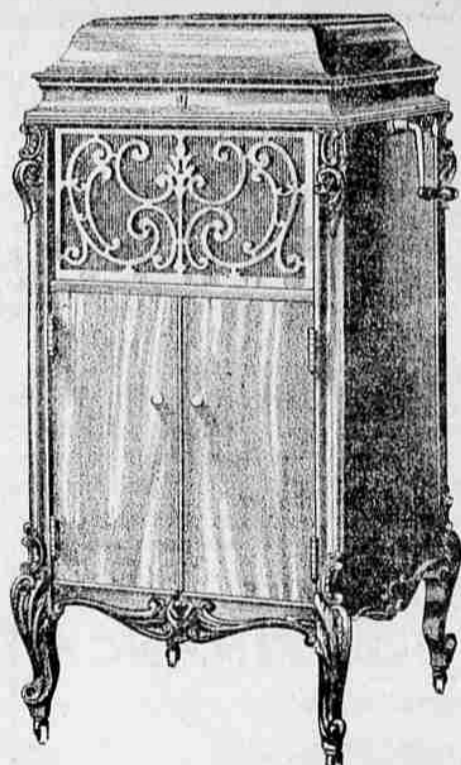
J. A. Branson and C. J. Scriber, of Marr Flat, were Joseph visitors the first of the week.
