ending July 31, 1917.

Fire chief reports two fires, one at Washington and N avenue, which was only a small roof fire doing practically no damage, and caused by sparks from the chimney falling on the dry shingles, and the other one at Birch and U avenue, where a railroad fence was found to be on fire. This was caused by cinders being piled too close to fence. Only chemicals used.

Street and water superintendent reports a total expenditure for the two departments of \$172, which includes crosswalks, street flushing and sprinkling, hauling gravel, lowering pipes and cost of placing valves on main Beaver Creek line.

Police department shows 16 arrests for the week, total fines \$57.50, fees from pound \$5, twelve days prison labor, \$24.00.

The manager, while in Portland, visited the chief forester and explained condition of Beaver Creek dam. After considerable conversation, was asked to have the city engineer submit plans for putting new top on dam in order that valve stems and gate wheels can be put in position. Mr. Buck, chief forester, seemed of the opinion that in view of the fact that dam had been subjected to full strain and had stood the pressure, there was no immediate danger, but that soft portion should be removed and new concrete with proper sand be added to present structure.

Also saw people who make wood pipe and was given prices but was told that the entire output manufactured on the cost had been contracted to the government and they were under bonds to take no orders for immediate delivery, but that they could fill order within next 30 days.
