Here Is A Modern Story Of Damon And Pythias-Hoover And Wilbur

Herbert Hoover and Ray Lyman Wilbur Were Friends in College—Hoover Gets on Board of Trustees of Stanford and Elects Wilbur President—Now He Puts Him to Work as Assistant Food Administrator.

Washington, July 26.—(United Press)—The Hoover-Wilbur combination is at work again, this time in the interests of the nation's welfare. Way back in the '90's Ray Lyman Wilbur was a junior in Leland Stanford University, at the same time that Herbert C. Hoover, then a big, gawky, mining student, was a senior. Both students were earning their own way through school, and incidentally just about running the school at the same time, according to reports. Hoover got himself elected financial manager of all athletics, with a small salary for his work, and thus added to his small income. This was one time when contrasts did not draw to each other. Neither man was brilliant and flashy—both had to dig for what they got, and neither had time to go in for the fraternity crowds. Unconsciously they formed a silent partnership based upon absolute trust and confidence in each other.

Clear down through all the years since the two students were graduated this partnership has continued, sometimes separated by half the distance around the earth. Letters were regular and often. When Herbert Hoover was appointed trustee of his old university, Leland Stanford, he had his partner, elected president of the university. And so they ran Stanford. Now Herbert C. Hoover, food administrator of the United States, has called his old partner to his assistance. Dr. Wilbur is to head the food conservation department, while Hoover heads the food control department. Thus continues the friendship, never a question when the other calls, each ready to give up everything to go to the other, with not a thought of material gain, for more than thirty years without a strain or friction.

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Portland, July 26.—(Special)—The receipts for the opening market were

about normal for this time of year; in view of the stock conditions throughout the country being 1250 cattle, 1200 hogs, 800 sheep.

Cattle

The cattle market opened draggy, with a prospect of a 25c to 50c cut, which developed to a 25c to 75c cut before the close of the market. The run of cattle was on the whole better than the previous week including several car loads of high bred Hereford and Shorthorn steers. The percentage of well-finished beef stuff in the yards was somewhat increased over last week's offering. The yards were emptied of all marketable stuff except some poorly bred Southern stock cattle which were held over in spite of a fairly active market late in the afternoon. The feature of the cattle market was a carload of beautiful white-faced feeders, weighing about 700 pounds, being almost uniform in size and contour. The prices paid are standing about as follows:

Hogs.

The hog market opened strong and active, with a demand exceeding the supply which resulted in springing the price back to the old figure of \$15.60 for tops. This means an advance of 15c to 25c over last week's prices. The top price was for Eastern Oregon, and Durocs, which were very satisfactorily finished for this time of year. Quotations now stand
