Frank J. Miller, chairman of the public service commission also is a possibility. But Mr. Miller's friends are urging him to seek his present office again. If he retires from the commission a new man would come on. As he is the only experienced man on the commission now, the result might be damaging.

Gus Moser still has ambitions, and is a formidable candidate. Gus got a good walloping the last time he ran, but came back and was elected state senator by a good vote. He had himself elected president of the senate and didn't overlook any chances to nurse his ambition while at that office. It is pretty well understood that he and the governor are not particularly friendly so his candidacy might add a little to the gaiety of the campaign.

Finally, George J. Cameron thinks he is going to run. George was district attorney in Multnomah county one time and has a good following. Last year he ran for delegate to the Chicago convention that nominated Hughes. He got a big vote throughout the state and now has the notion that he could get the same vote by running for governor.

Another element that will add to the free-for-all nature of the contest will be the entrance of the Farmers' Non-Partisan league into the politics of the state. This organization already controls the state offices of North Dakota and has established national headquarters at St. Paul. It is reaching out into other states of the Northwest and already is fairly well entrenched in Oregon. At the recent session of the state Grange at Astoria the League was invited to organize its membership in Oregon. It operates principally among farmers, and as the farming population is not as great, proportionately, in Oregon as in North Dakota its influence here is not likely to be so powerful. However, the Grange has a close working agreement with the State Federation of Labor and in that way the new organization can do a whole lot to sway an election. The combination might prove the balance of power in a contest split up between six or eight candidates.
